In accordance with RI Bylaws section 11.020., the Nominating Committee for RI Director in Zone 8 recently certified that it selected Rotarian Jessie H. Harman, a member of the Rotary Club of Wendouree Breakfast, as a RI director in 2021–23. Rotarian Harman has stated that she is willing and able to serve as director, if elected.

District 9800 nominee Lucienne Heyworth is one of 6 inspirational people honoured for their work with refugees.

Lucienne was a District 9800 sponsored Rotary Peace Fellow at Uppsala University, 2015-17 and will attend the Rotary Day at the UN Headquarters New York. Lucienne's Project was to develop an educational curriculum to be used in times of emergency, focused on the Middle East. This "education in emergencies" curriculum provides instructional materials that can be used in makeshift learning spaces to teach people displaced by conflict. Such spaces create critical safe places



for entire communities, where families can fill other basic needs like food, hygiene, and health. Lucienne, who was a teacher before she developed her expertise in providing education in areas of conflict, has focused her work in the Middle East. https://www.rotary.org/en/6-humanitarians-honored-their-work-refugees

Over the last 3 Sundays, Past District Governor Julie Mason assisted by District Governor Nominee Dale Hoy and PP Lesley McCarthy have presented the RLI program to over 40 participants.

Julie and Lesley have often commented that RLI should really be called the Rotary Learning program rather than Rotary Leadership Institute, as it is not just about leadership and preparing Rotarians to lead their clubs, but for anyone and everyone to learn more about Rotary.

This month, for the first time we welcomed Rotaractors from both Melbourne City and Gateway Rotaract as well as Rotarians from District 9810 to the Metro sessions. The diversity and mixture of not only age and gender but of cultural backgrounds, experiences and years in Rotary made for intense and valuable conversations during the 2 days.

This focus on learning was reinforced last Sunday when the program was presented in Bendigo to rural participants from the Bendigo clubs, Echuca and Rochester; and comments were made that the program had previously been seen as only for newer members.

The program of RLI which consists of 4 separate sections covers material





- 2. Members, teams and leaders: the structure of Rotary, leaders, leadership and succession planning; teams, and you as a leader.
- 3. Focussing and increasing humanitarian service: the Rotary Foundation, applying for grants, planning and implementing successful projects.
- 4. Enhancing Public Image and awareness focusses on sharing, celebrating and promoting what we do; Image and Brand, telling our stories.

Participants come away with workbooks containing a wealth of information, resources and weblinks for further research and information as well as a network of Rotarians to continue working with.

PP George Waters from the Rotary Club of Bendigo Sandhurst has communicated to us that he feels the program has matured to one of respecting our intellect and encompassing quite sophisticated notions from the world's experts.

Kaye Lehmann from Bendigo so impressed the attendees with her response to why Rotary? That a video was taken of her articulating this belief and has been shared on the District Facebook page.

District Foundation Scholarships

Applications Invited for District Foundation Scholarship Grants for 2020-2021

The District Foundation Committee once again invites clubs to apply for scholarships available for Year 10 students about to enter Year 11 in 2020.

Each scholarship is to be for \$2,000 over two years (11 and 12), made up of a Club contribution of \$1000 and a matching \$1000 District Foundation Grant.

The scholarships are to be used for the same student(s) each year.

Clubs are encouraged to commence discussions now with their chosen schools to ensure that enough time is allowed for schools to respond.

The purpose of the Scholarship Grant Program is to encourage talented and motivated young people facing financial barriers to successfully complete their Year 11 and Year 12 secondary education. A further goal of the program is to help clubs build stronger relationships with local schools. The program has been enormously successful throughout District 9800 for the past two years.

Preference will be given to applicant clubs that have not previously participated in the program, up until close of business on October 31st 2019. After that period, grants will be allocated on a first come first serve basis, so all clubs are encouraged to lodge applications promptly.

Club Youth Service Directors and Foundation Chairs will be emailed details of the program within the next few days and revised forms and guidelines are expected to be available on the District 9800 website shortly.

At Donations in Kind we love it when magic happens

At Donations in Kind, we love it when a plan forms and we are able to deliver it. This happened recently when we received a message from Roger Press of the Burwood Football Club on Sydney. who asked if we were interested in some soccer uniforms? We had no immediate need and had not replied to him.

Coincidentally, Bob Glindemann was taking part in a Rotary focus function at Hoppers Crossing and there met Fatma Hoben. Fatma who is of Somalia origin has for nearly two years been working with a number of families of various African backgrounds assisting them to assimilate into an Australian lifestyle, living with Australian values whilst retaining the links with their countries of origin. She has been in contact with Rotary club of Hoppers Crossing club member Des O'Shanassy regarding this matter.

In recent times she has been trying to build a sense of community through sport and has been trying , (without much success) to fund a local soccer club — The Young Leopards Soccer Club for kids of all ages. The Grange Secondary college through the assistance of Principal David Smillie has provided a ground and training facilities but they have not been able to finance soccer uniforms and spoke to him about her plight. Approaches to other organisations were similarly unsuccessful.

In typical Bob style, he made contact with Roger in Sydney and within a couple of weeks, together with the assistance of Paul Lomax of Gilders Transport who arranged to transport the cartons gratis, he had received a donation of nine boxes of full uniforms (shirts, shorts and socks) from a soccer club in Sydney who had changed club colours and no longer required their large store of new and used uniforms. He immediately contacted Des to confirm they were available. Fatma was thrilled to accept such a donation

On Saturday last, Fatma and members of the soccer team came to DIK for fittings and a photoshoot. She and members of the team were excited when they saw the clothing and we look forward to seeing the team on the ground in their new uniforms.

As Bob said:

"we love it when a plan comes together!"

5 Clubs, 2 Districts and zeal creates collaboration

Sometimes it takes a push to get Rotary clubs co-operating. Three years ago Jeff Taylor of Brighton North Rotary approached Bayside City Council about an excellence-in-business awards program. Early this year the council decided, "OK, providing you team with the other four bayside Rotary clubs and give us a good plan".

Brighton North and Brighton are in District 9800 and Hampton, Beaumaris and Sandringham clubs are in D9810. They range from 25 to 100-plus members: all up, about 250 to draw on for the committee of management.

They had plenty of their own projects on the go, but cooperate they did. The council gave the green light and provided a handsome initial sponsorship. The clubs developed the awards <u>website</u>, shared their know-how with the council and found further sponsors.

On October 3 winners collected awards at a 250-seat sold-out formal dinner at the Sandringham Yacht Club. Talks are under way about annual awards.

Bayside Mayor Michael Heffernan says, "Council jumped at the chance to recognise and reward our best local businesses. The participation level was incredible – more than 80 took part."

Christine Lindsey of Hampton Rotary, who chaired the project, is a professional events strategist. "No-one was territorial," she says. "We each took on different tasks. Brighton North ran the nominations; Brighton ran the sponsorships and judging, and Hampton took on overall management, website and legals. Bayside council ran the gala dinner and its Bayside Business Network was our project partner. "A Telstra Business Awards judge helped coordinate the judging panel, which had business, government and university members and made many site visits to the finalists."

Many Australian cities run business awards, but few involve Rotary. Brighton North originally had a small "Vocational Excellence Award" for businesses offering community support but it ran out of steam. Jeff Taylor, who's now joined Brighton RC, wanted to tie the award to the council's thriving Business Network, with its breakfasts for 200. His club joined the Network to promote its idea. "We loved to see the surprise, joy and pride of the winners," Jeff says.



Nick McDonald (CEO) and Thea McCroary (GM Sales and Marketing) are the brother and sister team that took Bayside's champion business Prestige Inhome Care to an astounding 550 staff covering Melbourne, Geelong and Sydney's East. Services range from personal care and around the home support through to 24/7 care for clients, all to help people live independently at home as long as possible.

Nick says, "The Rotary award process forced us to think strategically about how to manage our fast growth. We also want to contribute more to bayside communities. I took up an invite to a Brighton Rotary weekly dinner and made some good contacts and had a great time." His sister Thea says,

"Government support for in-home care constantly evolves and Rotary is a good way to get information out to the community."

The New-Business winner, Kicking Curves, is a two year old Brighton lingerie shop run by Myra Cooke and Mila Bushell, experts in bra fittings. "Our strengths are personalised service for women and a range from high-end to affordable," Myra says. The nine finalists included a French-themed dance studio, a travel agency, a tech venture and builder.

Chair Christine Lindsey says, "We all worked together really well. I hope our project is an inspiration to Rotary clubs around Australia."

Rotaractors, Rubbish, Recycling and Art

Melbourne Rotarian's turning the Yarra's trash into art raising awareness on pollution.

This is an amazing story about everyday people taking control of our city's pollution and not only doing something about it but also turning it into art that reminds us of the beauty of our environment and our need to preserve it.

Every month a group of Melbourne's Rotarians meet at Flinders street station with volunteers to clean up the Yarra. The aim - removing plastics and other waste from our waterways, surrounding vegetation and paths supporting a cleaner city and a pollution free water way.

Run by Melbourne City Rotaract club the idea is that the community can participate in the clean-up, enjoy fellowship together and enjoy the environment as part of the walk, removing visible amounts of pollution on the way.

The Project Leader Ludovic Grosjean is Chartered Engineer with 13 years of Ocean experience, and the Principal Consultant at OceanX Group, an Engineering Consultancy specializing in Environmental Pollution Monitoring here in Melbourne. He is also one of the director of the Environmental Sustainability Rotarian Action Group (ESRAG). As a supporter of Rotary values, he was passionate about providing an innovative approach to clean water through his environmental project "The Ocean CleanX". As a leader and community educator, Ludovic strives for projects to reduce water pollution on a global scale and will make a long-term difference for humanity. His career focus is to build collaboration between organizations in order to advance Engineering and preserve the Environment with the goal of Saving our Oceans and rivers.

When we asked Ludovic Grosjean what the main items found were he advised, "our last event has collected more than 1000 cigarette butts and over 1200 plastic items, we also recovered a bike".







Turning Trash into art

What has been collected has been turned into a beautiful piece of art by the world renown artist Mocha Li who creates ocean graphics and eco-bags to raise awareness and protect our oceans. She ties the environment into her work; her oil paintings contain recycled or reused materials; she also knits plastic yarns from deconstructed plastic water bottles and creates photoprinted bags.

"The Ocean CleanX" project artwork is a mixed media contemporary modern masterpiece with colours inspired by the Great Barrier Reef. In society today; can you still appreciate how beautiful nature is? Underneath all the natural colours, the painting contains rubbish collected during the Yarra river clean-up event where Rotarians and Rotaractors worked together to clean this popular waterway. As humanity is approaching

We can still rescue our oceans now, but people need to be aware of the urgency to act. Let's share the beautiful natural colours of our world and resist the temptation to use single use plastics before the problem completely block sour view.

- * Research scholars have been funded in areas such as anxiety, depression, substance abuse, self-harm and suicide.
- Rotary Clubs around Australia and private donors raise about \$2.5 million annually to support these research scholars.
- The aim to better educate members and guests on the issues of mental health was certainly met by Greg.






