Prahran Rotary fulfilling the People of Action Campaign

What a welcome (& farewell) from over 1,000 of the enrolled 2,300 kids at the New English School Baragaun Pimpri, India, for toilet/hand wash project partners Rotary Prahran, Rotary Club of Nasik Road and the Rotary Club of Sennor.

Twelve cubicles for the 300 or so senior girls. The next job, a toilet block for the younger girls. Then, finally one for the students who currently can aim at a tree.

There are children from 22 villages here, only around a quarter of them even have toilets at home.

The plan is to teach them about toilets, better personal hygiene & to pester their parents to accept the Indian Government subsidy to install a toilet at home.

I personally find Rotary Central Melbourne have used what can be a squirmish and difficult sergeant session as a time for good and to welcome project partners...here is a little about their fun

and inspiration in the words of the designer Rob Sosso

"Social EnterPrize; evolved from 'The Swindle', grandfathered by The Sergeant's Session.

- 1) to have at least one person win a prize at our weekly meeting
- 2) to have our club act as a catalyst for social impact and entrepreneurship
- 3) to raise funds for the club
- The mechanics are:

• each member of the club donates a bottle of "something" to later be drawn as a prize - i.e. 'Kickstart working capital' a Social EnterPrize has three objectives at each meeting

• members buy tickets into the Social EnterPrize draw, \$2 for one ticket or \$5 for three tickets. Initially one of the bottles will be the winner's prize.

the funds raised from the raffle are used to purchase additional prizes from Social Eenterprises

• at later raffles the items purchased from Social Enterprises are also won and used as an opportunity to profile the positive impact of that enterprise.

• estimates are the club will retain 70% of raffle income, after purchase of prizes from Social Enterprises.

A Social Enterprise is defined as an organisation running commercial operations to solve environmental and/or social issues. It will typically invest the majority of its surplus into the fulfillment of its mission.

I am now looking for more connections to Social Enterprises that we can support and profile. The four to date:

- Coffee vouchers from STREAT to support employment pathways for at risk / homeless youth
- Jam from RAM Jam to support malaria prevention in developing countries ['RAM' - Rotary Against Malaria]
- Soup from the SOUP PLACE to provide meals for Melbourne CBD homeless
- Cuvee Cider from LEARMONTH FOUNDATION to support community revitalisation and economic development in Learmonth and outer-Ballarat regions."

Yarra Bend Rotary Inspires in Nepal

If ever there was an international humanitarian project that reflects this year's Rotary Theme 'Be the Inspiration' it must surely be the Bright Future Community Centre (BFCC)in Nepal.

For ten years now, Yarra Bend Rotary has thrown its support behind the BFCC – a very special community facility for Nepalese women and children. Thanks to the commitment of Yarra Bend's Isabel Armer and her coordinator Netra Basnet in Nepal, the BFCC has continued to grow and prosper as an important place for the people of the Kangel and Kopan communities. Netra was born in Kangel, and his close contact with the local people has enabled Yarra Bend Rotary to extend its influence into the countryside and help the very poor people of Nepal.

Isabel says Yarra Bend Rotary helped start a computer school in 2007 and that ran successfully for 10 years.

"It enabled us to build a computer lab in one of the rooms at the Community Centre and some students have the skills to teach the younger students and there were some classes for older women."

The money that Isabel raises from her Camberwell Market stall together with funds donated by Yarra Bend Rotary supports more than 70 children to attend local schools.

At the Nepal end, Netra Basnet pays fees and helps check on families to make sure they are okay and sometimes buys extra clothing or food.

The BFCC building has grown from one room to four rooms to cater for the expanding numbers. The original plan for a library was abandoned because the children do not have time to read, but some books could be used to help older people with literacy skills. The schools value homework which has to be completed to avoid punishment and often children have to help with chores, Isabel says.

"The older children are running homework classes in the evening and morning and there are holiday programs run by volunteers. Some of the older children teach traditional dances which the young children are keen to learn."

Suroj has some kidney complaint and Rotary paid for his hospital treatment when everyone thought he would die.



BFCC is much more than a centre for children. A sewing school for women began in 2012 and that has developed into a business which makes kits for the Women's Health program, similar to the Days for Girls program.

Beyond the BFCC, Yarra Bend Rotary donated money following the devastating Nepal earthquake in 2015 and this was invested in a water project in Kopan. The Village Development Committee has extended this project and over 300 houses in Kopan now have access to clean water.

Isabel says there are some exciting recent developments in Nepal that have moved quickly from sporadic help for schools to a couple of projects which could have a really worthwhile long term impact.



"We are already supporting some very poor children to attend school and we're hoping to extend this help to other poor children in Kangel,"

The Rotary Club of Yarra Bend, with a Matching District Grant, is also helping establish the Kangel Learning Centre, which has two rooms for sewing and computers. The completion date is officially October 2019, but some sections are already running. The local Village Development Committee is very keen to be involved which should ensure its early completion and success.

ESSENDON ROTARY PUBLISHES ITS PROUD HISTORY OF SERVICE

The Rotary Club of Essendon has published a history of the Club which was launched at their President's Night on June 15th last.

Essendon was the first metropolitan club in Australia and was chartered in 1935 at the request of the former Essendon City Council. Membership peaked at 99 in the 1980"s.


The club has sponsored five daughter clubs from which it has now six grand-daughter clubs and five great grand-daughter clubs. Amongst its major achievements have been the building of a children's traffic school, an administrative building for the Royal District Nursing Service, the Rowallan scout camp at Riddell's Creek and a sound shell in the city major park.

In the past 20 years the Club has shifted its major projects internationally and with the help of external benefactors successfully developed projects worth more than 2 million dollars in Myanmar, Kenya, the Philippines, Cambodia and Peru.

2018-2019 President Veronica O'Sullivan is the sixth female president.

Rotary International President Barry Rassin

A well-known saying goes, "If you want to change the world, go home and love your family." That doesn't mean people should ignore the needs outside their own homes; instead, they should pay attention to the needs within.

It can be tempting, when our priority is service, to focus only on the things that look like service: the projects, the planning, the work that yields a visible benefit to those who need it. But to do that work effectively, we need to keep our own house in order.

In Rotary, that means conducting ourselves in accordance with the principles of Rotary, treating others with respect, and following The Four-Way Test. It means maximizing our impact by planning carefully



and stewarding our resources wisely. And it means looking after the long-term health of our organization by ensuring that our membership is strong, engaged, and healthy.

Our membership has hovered around the same 1.2 million mark for 20 years. We aren't growing, and our membership is getting older. We have too many clubs that don't have the knowledge or motivation to have an impact: clubs that don't know what we're doing on a global level, clubs that don't know about our programs or our Foundation, that don't even know how to get involved. And with a membership that is still mostly male, we clearly aren't doing enough to become the organization of choice for women who are seeking to serve.

We are a membership organization first. If we want to achieve the goals we've set for ourselves, we need to put membership first. All of us have a responsibility to take membership seriously, not only by inviting prospective members, but also by making sure new members are welcomed into clubs that offer them something of value. If you see someone walk into a meeting and hesitate, be sure that person has a place to sit and is part of the conversation. If you're enthusiastic about a Rotary program, make sure your club knows about it and knows how to get involved. If you see a need in your community, talk about it at this week's meeting. If we want to be part of an organization that's strong, that's active, that's having an impact – start at home, and **Be the Inspiration in Rotary**.

Rotary Club of Brighton and Swim Vietnam

Following our recent donation of \$15,000 we received the following progress report from **Swim Vietnam**. They thanked the **Rotary Club of Brighton** for supporting Swim Vietnam and said our support allowed them to continue their work in the prevention drowning and water safety lessons throughout Vietnam! They said they couldn't do it without us.

What they have achieved:

- 855 children taught to swim in the last quarter at Nguyen Du, Luong The Vinh and Tien Phuoc pools and other pools will be completing their swim programs in mid-July.
- Our trainers, Trung and Chien delivered an AUSTSWIM teacher of swimming and water safety course to 11 candidates in Hanoi in partnership with Green Pool.
- 50 teachers from Quang Binh attended the Swim Vietnam teacher training course in water safety and swimming techniques.
- Our AUSTSWIM presenters, Long and trainer presenter, Cuc were part of the AUSTSWIM teacher of swimming and water safety courses held in Ho Chi Minh in partnership with Water Safety Vietnam. These courses were conducted in over a week for 65 candidates.
- Our AUSTSWIM trainer presenters Vu and Linh participated in presenting the AUSTSWIM teacher of swimming and water safety courses to additional 65 m students from the Ho Chi Minh university of physical education and sports with the assistance from trainers from Water Safety Vietnam.
- Our trainer Long assisted Mr David Field from Surf Life Saving Vietnam with the three-day training for advanced CPR, competitive swim strokes and lifeguard rescues with the US Army Pacific in Nha Trang.
- David Hurt from Royal Life Saving Australia and Swim Vietnam Trustee conducted the advanced CPR and First Aid training for the trainer staff of Swim Vietnam.
- 310 teachers from Quang Tri were trained in Swim Vietnam's survival swimming skills & water safety knowledge course.
- 28 swimming teachers from Que Son attended the professional development training conducted by Swim Vietnam trainers for upskilling.

- Swim Vietnam delivered CPR training for 25 teenagers aged 14 to 21 of STREETS International as a charitable donation.
- 43 swim teachers from Hoian completed the Swim Vietnam professional development swimming and water safety training for upskilling.
- Our director, Doan Minh Trung was part of the workshop for implementation of child drowning prevention in Vietnam between MOLISA (Ministry of Labour, Invalids and Social Affairs), Bloomberg, WHO (World Heath Organisation) and GHAI (Global Health Advocacy incubator).

The workshop for implementation of child drowning prevention in Vietnam between MOLISA (Ministry of Labour, Invalids and Social Affairs), Bloomberg, WHO (World Heath Organisation) and GHAI (Global Health Advocacy incubator). The workshop aimed to investigate drowning deaths in 8 different provinces: Lao Cai, Yen Bai, Ninh Binh, Thanh Hoa, Quang Binh, DakLak, Dong Thao, Soc Trang before carrying out the drowning prevention projects in these provinces.

What they Envisage in the next quarter to do:

- Special swimming Programs for children with disabilities from Kianh Foundation, Hearing And Beyond and CHIA (Children Hope's In Action) funded by Water Skills For Life and Karma Group.
- Hold Austswim courses of teacher of swimming and water safety, infant and preschool aquatic and towards competitive strokes in July and August.
- Austswim presenter, Sue's coming over to lead Austswim courses and assess Swim Vietnam's teachers.
- Promote the lifeguard course.
- Build the social enterprise website in English and Vietnamese.

The Future going forward:

- Plan to teach additional 1500-1700 children to swim in the next 6 months in Quang Nam and continue to train additional 100 swim teachers of water safety and swimming across the region.
- Continue to delivering the based-classroom water safety lessons for children in winter time.
- Work with the government and other drowning prevention NGOs to spread classroom based water safety education to every school aged child in Vietnam.
- Become a training centre aiming at training teachers of swim skills, water safety education, lifesaving and first aid.
- Together with the government contributing to the drowning prevention for children in Vietnam.

When these children arrived we check their badges, then bring them inside the compound to play and have fun with other children and some volunteers. They then have food and drinks, and receive presents from Father Christmas.

Is it time for a re-read of Rotary?



English was not my father's first language. And like a lot of second language learners, he was an avid reader. He especially liked Conrad and Melville and read their bodies of work not once but several times during his life. As a young man, it was not uncommon for him to drop my mother off at her home after a date and head for a neighbourhood diner, book in hand, to read and drink coffee until the night waitress closed up and shooed him home.

Later in life, he added Louis L'Amour westerns to his list of favourites. One of the simple and great pleasures of his day was to settle into a comfortable chair in the evening to revisit a favourite read for a second or third time – or more.

Why did he prefer to re-read, rather than switch to something new? I asked him once. His answer, like him, was straightforward but not necessarily simple: it was a good book the last time, and he got something new from a book every time he read it.

Lately it's occurred to me that my father got something new out of old favourites in part because his insights changed with his life experience. The books weren't different but what he brought to them each time was.

"There will come a time when you believe everything is finished. That will be the beginning." — Louis L'Amour
