Rotary clubs worldwide meet US\$200 million fundraising challenge

Rotary International has succeeded in meeting the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation's US\$200 million match in funding for polio eradication, raising more than \$202.6 million as of 17 January.

"We'll celebrate this milestone, but it doesn't mean that we'll stop raising money or spreading the word about polio eradication," Rotary Foundation Trustee John F. Germ told Rotary leaders at the International Assembly in San Diego, California, USA. "We can't stop until our entire world is certified as polio-free."

The fundraising milestone was reached in response to \$355 million in challenge grants awarded to The Rotary Foundation by the Gates Foundation. All funds have been earmarked to support polio immunization activities in affected countries where the vaccine-preventable disease continues to paralyze children.

"In recognition of Rotary's great work, and to inspire Rotarians in the future, the [Gates] foundation is committing an additional \$50 million to extend our partnership," said Jeff Raikes, chief executive officer of the Gates Foundation. "Rotary started the global fight against polio, and continues to set the tone for private fundraising, grassroots engagement, and maintaining polio at the top of the agenda with key policymakers." Raikes also addressed Rotary leaders at the International Assembly.

The new \$50 million grant from the Gates Foundation is not a challenge grant.

Since 1988, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99 percent, from about 350,000 cases annually to fewer than 650 cases reported so far for 2011. The wild poliovirus is now endemic in only four countries: Afghanistan, India, Nigeria, and Pakistan. However, India on 13 January marked a full calendar year without a case, paving the way for its removal from the endemic list.

But other countries also remain at risk for polio cases imported from the endemic countries. In Africa in 2011, Chad and the Democratic Republic of the Congo had significant outbreaks. Also in 2011, a small cluster of polio cases in China, which had been polio-free for a decade, was traced to Pakistan.

Rotary club members not only reached into their own pockets to support the Gates challenge, but also engaged their communities in a variety of creative fundraising projects, such as a fashion show in California that raised \$52,000, benefit film screenings in New Zealand and Australia that netted \$54,000, and a pledge-supported hike

through Kilimanjaro, Tanzania, that brought in \$38,000. Many events were planned around 24 October, widely observed as World Polio Day.

To date, Rotarians worldwide have contributed more than \$1 billion toward the eradication of polio, a cause Rotary took on in 1985. In 1988, the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention joined Rotary as spearheading partners of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. More recently, the Gates Foundation has become a major supporter. In 2007, the Gates Foundation gave Rotary a \$100 million challenge grant for polio eradication, increasing it to \$355 million in 2009. Rotary agreed to raise \$200 million in matching funds by 30 June 2012.

Reaching children with the oral polio vaccine in the disease's remaining strongholds is labor- and resource-intensive due to a host of challenges, including poor infrastructure, geographical isolation, armed conflict, and cultural misunderstanding about the eradication campaign.

A WORKING HOLIDAY - St Vincents Hospital Medical Equipment

While most people were focussed on holidays, at the end of December 30 of our Members and Partners from nine Rotary Clubs were hard at work on this project. St Vincents Hospital is replacing its existing electric beds and we were offered 72, but there were some conditions. The beds had to be removed progressively on the 29-30/12/11. This was a significant logistical exercise as the hospital had to continue to function while the new beds were delivered and assembled, the patients had to swap beds and the old beds had to be removed from a loading dock with limited space.

As we progress some additional material became available and there were delays with delivery of the new beds and our container, which presented some challenges. Special thanks goes to PE Mark Caldwell from the (RC Balwyn) who provided a truck with one days notice. We also need to acknowledge the effort of PP Bob Glindemann (RC Melbourne) who organized the event and supervised from WA, President Austin Burleigh the on site General and PP Laurie Fisher (RC West Footscray) who controlled the Donations In Kind activity.



Day one 48 beds and 37 over-bed tables were packed in a container that was collected the following morning and is destined for Bairo Pite Clinic in East Timor. The balance of the items were trucked to the Rotary Donations In Kind Store. In total we had moved 90 hospital beds, 37 over-bed tables, 54 bedside storage units and 5 electric patient examination tables. The effort by our Members was excellent and everyone involved had a buzz knowing how beneficial the equipment will be. The balance of the goods will be shipped in January to the Philippines to assist the flood ravaged area and another Clinic in East Timor. As we have received more equipment than planned we would like to encourage the Clubs who have not contributed to think about donating some DIK freight funds, its only \$150/bed an amount most Clubs can handle.

The Rotary Leadership Institute 2012

The Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) is a multi-district leadership development program which seeks to have Rotary Clubs identify those Rotarians who seem to have the potential for future club leadership (not necessarily as club presidents) and provide those so identified with a quality education in Rotary knowledge and leadership skills for voluntary organisations.

RLI strongly believes that having leadership skills does not alone assure good Rotary leadership. An effective Rotary leader must also have Rotary knowledge, perspective about where Rotary has been, where it is going and a vision of what Rotary can be.

RLI is a series of fast paced, interactive, one-day courses offered to refine a Rotarian's leadership skills and increase their base of knowledge in Rotary. Courses are fun, topical, interactive, and geared toward busy business and professional persons who want to be more effective leaders in their vocation and club and more knowledgeable Rotarians.

Courses are run by experienced, formally trained Rotarians in this district. Participants are expected to contribute their experience and ideas in facilitated discussion groups – usually 15 participants and the aim is to acquire Rotary knowledge and understanding of how Rotary operates differently in clubs and learn from these differences. The style of the courses is conversational and learning comes by sharing knowledge, ideas and opinions.

The Institute offers courses in three full day sessions - 9.00am to 3.15pm

and participants must complete Part 1 before proceeding to Part 2 then graduating after completion of Part 3 however the completion of all three parts may be completed at your own timing.

The course dates for the first six months of the 2012 are as follows:

- Part 1** Sunday February 26 and Sunday March 25
- Part 2** Sunday April 15 and Sunday April 29
- Part 3** Sunday May 13 and Sunday May 27

Rotary Clubs are encouraged to select at least two candidates for RLI annually. Students return to their club with enthusiasm, new contacts, fresh ideas, an increased understanding of their potential as Rotarians, and valuable skills impacting their potential leadership in the club. For 2009/2010 the cost per Rotarian is \$55.00 and it is usual for clubs to pay this charge for their members.

Siti's Story

Siti Aisyah is an Interplast success story. A representation of our hopes and aspirations for all our patients, Siti's journey serves as an inspirational and proud reminder of the impact Interplast has in our neighbouring countries.

Due to an infection which leads to destruction of the flesh, Siti lost a substantial portion of her upper lip and cheek. As a result she experienced extreme difficulties with drinking and eating. Her nutritional intake was restricted to soft food and she was forced to use a small spoon to feed herself.

Siti's impoverished childhood, coupled with her early illness, meant she didn't attend school until she was seven years of age. However, she worked exceptionally hard and excelled. Constantly teased for her deformity, Siti first met Interplast in 2005 as a 16-year-old girl hidden behind a face cloth to disguise her defect. Funded by Batu Hijau Doctors Children's Fund, her first Interplast operation allowed Siti to eat normally for the first time in 14 years.

With an additional procedure in 2009, Siti is now a far cry from the shy, reclusive young girl we first met. She's a confident, lipstick-wearing woman in pursuit of a successful nursing career. She's completed her higher education and is currently sourcing the funds, alongside the Doctors Children's Fund, to allow her to pursue her dream of being a nurse.

Founded in 1983 as a joint project of the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons and Rotary District 9800, Interplast Australia & New Zealand is a charity that sends teams of fully qualified surgeons, anaesthetists, nurses and allied therapists to developing countries in the Asia Pacific Region to provide free surgical treatment and medical training.

Rochester Commemorative Plaque Unveiled

On Sunday, district residents gathered for the unveiling of a commemorative plaque stating the height the Campaspe River rose this time last year.

The plaque shows the January flood was 125mm higher than the 1916 flood and 230mm higher than the 1958 flood.




For those unfamiliar with the distinction, Peacebuilder Districts are districts across the world, that understand the importance of creating peace and resolving conflict in our global community. They allocate a minimum of US\$50,000 over two years from their District Designated Funds to support Rotary Peace Fellows. Districts committed to building peace continue to donate US\$25,000 a year in DDF to maintain their Peacebuilder Status.

For their generous commitment, Peacebuilder districts are recognized by the Rotary Peace Centers Department and the Rotary Foundation with a Peacebuilder Banner, pins and a certificate.

D9800 became a Peacebuilder district in the 2009-10 Rotary year, so this is our third year as a member of what would seem to be a fairly exclusive group: there are only 44 Peace Builder Districts in the Rotary world.

Top Five Rotary Stories of 2011



From the tsunami in Japan to the launch of strategic partnerships that will help Rotary expand its reach, 2011 was an eventful year for Rotary International and Rotarians. As the year winds down, we share our list of the top five Rotary news events of 2011.

1. Tsunami strikes Japan

Rotary clubs and districts worldwide mobilized to bring aid to victims of the devastating earthquake and tsunami that struck Japan on 11 March. The 9.0-magnitude quake, the strongest in Japan's history, and the resulting tsunami caused widespread destruction, paralyzing much of the northern coast.

2. RI theme

RI President-elect Sakuri Tanaka unveiled the RI theme Peace Through Service during the opening plenary session of the 2012 International Assembly.

"Peace, in all of the ways that we can understand it, is a real goal and a realistic goal for Rotary," he said.

3. The fight against polio

India has been making great strides toward polio eradication in 2011, with only one case of the virus reported from January through early December. Rotarians helped administer bivalent oral polio vaccine to more than 35 million children in the country during a Subnational Immunization Day on 13 November.

4. 2011 RI Convention

More than 16,000 Rotarians from around the world converged on New Orleans, Louisiana, USA, in May for the 2011 RI Convention. Rotaractors, Rotarians, and Rotary Foundation alumni participated in service projects to help families still recovering from damage caused by Hurricane Katrina in 2005.

5. Strategic partnerships

The Rotary Foundation Board of Trustees approved four strategic partnerships in 2011 under the Future Vision Plan. These partnerships will help Rotary broaden its impact in the areas of focus by offering service opportunities for Rotarians through packaged global grants.

The new year has taken off in a Rotary sense with the farewell dinner for the Group Study Exchange Team who visit India from the 15th January to the 14th February.

Fourteen members from the Rotary Club of Williamstown were there to support PP Murray Verso and his team of Melissa Mom, Del King, Lizz Bailey and James Mepham.

The Group Study Exchange program commenced in 1965 with District 9800 being one of 13 worldwide to participate. One of the team members was our own Jeff Bird who with 5 others and a team leader spent 10 weeks in Canada. This entire group continues to meet for lunch once a year!

Since 1965 over 70,000 people have participated in the program, and District 9800 has been involved in 41 exchanges.

The 2012 team will be in India, D3030 (Maharashtra) for 4 weeks. This District has 84 Clubs with over 4,000 members.

During the course of their visit they will speak to 12 Clubs and attend a District Conference attended by 1500 Rotarians.




The Foundation Breakfast at the Conference over the last few years has grown in stature to now be one of the many highlights of the District 9800 Conference.

- 2.** ROMAC – Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children. About 30 children with life threatening conditions receive the much needed surgery each year. It is a struggle to obtain the surgery for the children these days, however, a great deal of success has been achieved.
- 3.** Darryl also runs between 30 and 50 projects concurrently. For example, the Kalamunda Rotary Club runs an alternative 'Schoolies' Program, where students do community work in Timor instead of the usual things leavers do.

Members of the Rotary Club of Balwyn North hardly stopped recently during a busy week of volunteer work in Loddon Shire, helping out with flood recovery efforts across the northern parts of the shire.

The visitors stayed at the Boort Recreational Reserve, but travelled as far as Kerang, Jarklin, Durham Ox, Yarrawalla and Borung, working on clean-up, fence clearing, gardening and general tidying of properties.

Boort District Health co-ordinated the works program for the week. Flood support worker Marg Van Veen said the team, which varied from six to 16 members during the week, had helped about 20 families.

"They did such tasks as removing damaged fencing, building new fences, sanding and painting houses and repairing damaged machinery," Mrs Van Veen said.

"They cleared yards of flood debris, repaired sprinkler systems, did gardening and cut down an awful lot of grass and weeds, just to get to the fences. "Having worked with them a couple of times, I know they worked incredibly hard – there was no idle chit-chat."

"It was hard slog until break time, then all the jokes would start. It's amazing how much the group has accomplished in just one week. "There are properties out there where the men could have spent the whole week, but we wanted to share their time around as much as possible."

"Their aim was not to do everything on each property, but to complete just one or two projects, to help lighten the load for the people affected by the floods. Rotary Club Locator app

The Rotary Club Locator app helps you find a Rotary club meeting when you're on the go.

- The "Near Me" search locates clubs within a physical radius of 100 miles. (Note: Actual driving distances may be further.)
- A keyword search for clubs. This search looks for the keyword in either the club name or meeting location address. This is useful for finding clubs that are outside of the 100-mile radius from your current location.
- A map showing a club's location and driving directions
- The ability to save search results to a list of favourite clubs
- The ability to add a club to your phone's contact list
- The club's website and primary phone number, if available
- A search function to find clubs by district

To view club officer contact information, you must login into the app with your RI Member Access login information.

Rotary celebrates India's first polio-free year

India's last reported case was a two-year-old girl in West Bengal State on 13 January 2011. The country recorded 42 cases in 2010, and 741 in 2009.

A chief factor in India's success has been the widespread use of the bivalent oral polio vaccine, which is effective against both remaining types of the polio virus. Another has been rigorous monitoring, which has helped reduce the number of children missed by health workers during National Immunization Days to less than 1 percent, according to the World Health Organization (WHO).

Rotary has been a spearheading partner in the *Global Polio Eradication Initiative* since 1988, along with WHO, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation is also a key supporter of the initiative.

Sporting their signature yellow vests and caps, the nearly 119,000 Rotarians in India have helped administer vaccine to children, organize free health camps and polio awareness rallies, and distribute banners, caps, comic books, and other items.

"With the support of their Rotary brothers and sisters around the world, Indian Rotarians have worked diligently month after month, year after year, to help organize and carry out the National Immunization Days that reach millions of children with the oral polio vaccine," says RI President Kalyan Banerjee, of the Rotary Club of Vapi, Gujarat.

"As an Indian, I am immensely proud of what Rotary has accomplished. However, we know this is not the end of our work. Rotary and our partners must continue to immunize

children in India and in other countries until the goal of a polio-free world is finally achieved."

Rotary Maternal Health Project

The Rotary Maternal Health Project, initiated by The Rotarian Action Group for Population Growth & Sustainable Development, has been included in the list of UN Commitments 2011.

- This makes RFPD one of about 200 organizations, including 50 governments, which committed to promote and implement the UN Global Strategy on Women's and Children's Health. Through this project maternal mortality was reduced by 50% in selected hospitals in Northern Nigeria. One year after the project ended, a reduction in maternal mortality of 60% was documented, proving that this model is sustainable.
- This Rotary signature project was published in Rotary and other media e.g. the International Journal of Gynecology and Obstetrics. It is regarded as a model to reduce maternal and newborn mortality. Our model contributes to Rotary's new area of focus 'Maternal & Child Health', as well as to the Millennium Development Goal (MDG) 5, which is most 'off track' amongst the MDGs.
- RI has heavily promoted the six new areas of focus, one being 'Maternal & Child Health'. The newest brochure 'Rotary's Areas of Focus' stresses that "53 million unintended pregnancies could be prevented through family planning". "What you can do: Provide access to family planning, information and resources. Meeting this need could reduce the number of maternal deaths by nearly 30 percent".

The Rotarian Action Group for Population Growth & Sustainable Development, held a series of successful meetings at the Rotary International Convention in New Orleans in May 2011. At the invitation of Rotary International, RFPD presented its 10th breakout session – "Maternal & Child Health", which over two hundred people attended. Film Producer, Dawn Sinclair Shapiro, was presented with RFPD's Award for Courage, for her documentary, "The Edge of Joy", a film about the trials of maternal care in Nigeria.


Peace Through Service

Reader's Letters

Dear Clarice,

The 2011 version of the Foundation Facts brochure is now available and as usual, it's filled with interesting facts and lots of good things to talk about. Just to quickly review the highlights of our achievements:

PolioPlus - We may have reached the \$200 million target but the work goes on. During the year, a total of \$76.7 million went to polio grants.

Matching Grants - During the year there were 1,634 grants approved with program awards reaching \$33.2 million. These were for grants to non-pilot districts only.

Future Vision Pilot - Of the 100 districts participating in the pilot program, 95 districts received district grants totaling over \$6.1 million and 208 global grants totalling almost \$9.3 million.

District Simplified Grants - Supporting short term service activities on non-FV pilot districts, 351 grants were approved with a total program ward on \$7.0 million

Rotary Peace Fellows - During the year, 79 peace fellows from 42 countries began master's degrees and professional certificate studies at a cost of \$4.1 million.

Ambassadorial Scholarships - In 2010-11, 414 scholars from 52 countries followed their dreams by continuing their educations and gaining a better understanding of the world and program awards were \$9.7 million.

Group Study Exchange - One of Rotary's most popular Foundation programs saw 324 teams travel abroad with itinerary's covering vocational, educational and cultural topics. Program awards were \$2.8 million.

Why am I telling you all this when you can read it in the leaflet? I just wanted to emphasise the fact that none of this would be possible without strong Club and Rotarian support for the Annual Program Fund and for PolioPlus. We will only ever be able to do as much as our finances allow us to do, so let's spend more time proudly talking about the great things we do to make our world a better place. If Rotarians and Clubs understand the value of The Foundation's work they will surely give their support.

Dear Clarice

I am sorry that I have not been able to update you more often than I have but a hectic schedule and a lack of connectivity makes it tricky. I'm sure you can appreciate the problem.

To give people some idea of our activities, James has worked hard to take as many pictures as possible and to put them on the Facebook site. Unfortunately, we are well behind on updating the blog.

We are now in the city of Akola, population around 800,000. The team are very impressive to see in action. They all make friends easily, ask a lot of intelligent questions and get on well together. We sometimes attract especially in areas not used to seeing westerners. We are often stopped in the street by people wanting to photograph us. The "GSE smile" is used a lot but happily so.

So far we have maintained our good spirits although I find the itinerary, which can change hour by hour, a bit frustrating. We now are learning to operate on Indian time. Breakfast can be between 8 and 11 am and dinner is rarely before 11pm. Our first presentation was to 5 clubs at a dinner held in a large garden. WE gave it at 10.30pm but it was very well received. At each presentation we will try to include photos of our hosts. It worked well in Amaravati on Thursday night.

Vocational visits have been a bit light on but useful. Mel & Del were well taken care of by the police. Jim spent a morning working with a professional photographer, Lizz was asked to visit and give a talk to an MBA class and I spent some time touring a small private hospital owned and operated by a female gynaecologist and a male laparoscopic surgeon (husband & wife). We have enjoyed comparing notes with our Indian colleagues.

We all spent a few hours at a surgical hospital operated by RC of Nagpur South in a town in the mountains using TRF matching grants with US clubs. We were all quite moved by the scope of the project and the dramatic effect it is having on an isolated community with no access to health care. Jim's photographs of this project are an example of superb photo journalism. Touch wood no major hiccups so far.

The GSE experience hard work but the returns are great.




The Foundation Breakfast at the Conference over the last few years has grown in stature to now be one of the many highlights of the District 9800 Conference.
