Yarra Cluster - a profile of leafy suburbs with top schools in the inner East.

During Rotary year 2012-2013, Peter Allen and Don Jago of Rotary Club of Camberwell in Eastside Cluster initiated, in conjunction with civic leaders in the City of Boroondara, a movement that quickly became 'Boroondara Cares'. Yarra Cluster clubs, namely Glenferrie, Hawthorn, Kew and Kew on Yarra, all operating from within the CBD end of City of Boroondara, were characteristically quick to join in. Boroondara Cares is now becoming a signature rallying title, prominent in Rotarians at Work Day and promising to be a focus for local community group activities. There are now plans to align the soon-to-be-

(coordinated by Hawthorn).

Yarra Cluster clubs integrate constantly. Each has at least one signature international and local project that other clubs support.

Glenferrie's involvement in the international (Indonesia) Sumba eye project is supported vocationally by Kew and financially by all cluster clubs. At Glenferrie's changeover Team Leader

Dr Mark Ellis AM was presented with a cheque for over \$20,000 raised at a recent Back to the 60's Dinner Dance at Genazzano FCJ College in Kew, supported by Cluster clubs. Other international projects are in North India (Hawthorn), Timor-Leste (Kew) and Nepal (Kew on Yarra).

Kew's biennial Garden DesignFest

is a unique event for the garden industry. It attracts visitors from across Victoria, and has excited interest in other States and in New Zealand. In this past Rotary year this event raised over \$95,000, shared by all the Yarra cluster clubs and charities which partnered to help conduct the event, plus leading support from the Rotary Club of Brighton North.

Other signature activities open to cluster support during this past Rotary year included the Farmers Market (Glenferrie), Kooyong Classic Parking and Christmas Lunch for Socially Isolated (Hawthorn), Life After Stroke Mentoring Program (Kew) and the co-hosting of Danish Youth Exchange student Anemone Kirk (led by Kew on Yarra) who returned home on 5th July (photo).



And there is a growing connectivity with the numerous secondary and primary schools in Yarra Cluster's patch.

# **Foundation Alumni Award**

#### **BRITISH OPHTHALMOLOGIST RECEIVES TOP FOUNDATION ALUMNI AWARD**

Dr. Harminder Singh Dua, an Indian-born ophthalmologist in Nottingham, England, received the 2012-13 Rotary Foundation Global Alumni Service to Humanity Award at the Rotary International Convention in Lisbon, Portugal, in late June. He was nominated for the award by District 3030 (Maharashtra, India).

Dua, who is chair and professor of ophthalmology at the University of Nottingham, Queen's Medical Centre, has treated patients in the United Kingdom, India, and the United States and has shared his skills with students and colleagues around the world. Renowned as an authority on corneal disorders, he performs advanced surgeries.

While living in India, Dua performed thousands of free operations on poor patients with cataracts and glaucoma at free eye clinics sponsored by Rotarians and nongovernmental organizations.

"The poverty and simple lives of the villagers and the huge difference [the] operations made to them, and to the lives of children who had to spend time away from school to guide the people around, was plain to see," he said. "There was no escaping the enormity of their need and our [medical team's] ability to fulfill some part of it."



More recently, Dua is credited with discovering a previously undetected layer of the human eye that is located at the back of the cornea -- a discovery that was reported in the journal Ophthalmology in May. Called

Dua's layer, it is much thinner than a human hair. Its discovery is expected to make corneal transplant surgery safer and simpler, and to contribute to knowledge about some diseases affecting that part of the eye



Dear Rotarians,

My first and foremost Rotary Moment was some 5 years after I joined the Rotary Club of Melton Valley. As a member of the Club I was involved in the fellowship and the odd fundraising event, but then in 1999 I was asked to chair my Club's International Committee. I recall wondering what that might mean, and as it was a young Club there was not a lot of experienced members within the Club to go and ask.

After discussing this with the President Elect I decided to go to District Assembly and see what I could learn. The rest, as they say is history. The following year the Club had secured a Partner Club in India as well as a Matching Grant, and between the parties involved raised over \$30,000.00 towards the **Rotary International Cataract Surgery** Program being performed in India.

Our Committee had engaged our Club, an International Partner and received back with interest what we had donated to The Rotary Foundation. Most importantly we had sponsored over 1,500 eye operations and gave sight to people we will never meet, never really know, but whose lives we really changed in many significant ways . . . the 80 year old blind villager who could see again, and see his beautiful five year old granddaughter for the first time; the girls staying home to look after those family members who had lost their sight were free to go to school and

study for the first time; and those villagers with their sight restored could contribute to their villages in tangible ways instead of being a burden on their families.

- Free child minding, if required.


