Whilst we immediately established the Bushfire Recovery Fund to support our projects, this Fund does not have a tax deductible status and we are now very close to finalising a second fund which will allow tax deductible donations for Rotarians and Friends of Rotary who wish to make valued tax deductible donations. Both funds will work in tandem to finance the numerous projects our clubs will get involved in, in both the short and long-term.

At last night's District Leadership Team meeting it was evident that the normal work of Rotary is continuing at a pace with extensive reports from our Leadership Team. DGE Colin Muir was delighted with the success of the PrePETS program that was run last Sunday at Macedon and is looking forward to the PETS program in April.

This morning we also welcomed the Swedish GSE Team at Tullamarine airport, next week's Networker will include an article about the incoming GSE Teams. I hope you will get a chance to meet them at one of the many functions being held during their visit.

Bushfire Recovery

What we are doing.

As with all Victorians our District has been profoundly saddened and touched by the tragedy of the Victorian Bushfires. With the fires destroying homes and claiming lives throughout the heart of our state we have been overwhelmed by the response of Rotarians around the nation and indeed the world.

What is particularly heartening is the willingness of The Family of Rotary from far and wide to ask "What can we do to help?".





In response, we wanted to share with you some ideas on how we can assist those dealing with the consequences and challenges of the bushfires.

Donate

Rotary District 9800 has opened a trust fund account to provide assistance to affected communities. Rotarians, corporate supporters, Friends of Rotary and members of the public can make donations to the "Rotary International D 9800 Bushfire Recovery Fund", BSB Number 013 345, Account Number 2521 12703 (Swift code ANZBAU3M) at any ANZ Bank. Cash donations enable us to support the changing needs of bushfire victims as time goes on. They allow us the flexibility to appropriately adapt our response to local needs, which will no doubt change as the focus of communities switch from short-term survival and shelter requirements to the rebuilding of community infrastructure. Recognising that there are already many Non-Government Organisations already working in affected areas, this medium to long-term period will be the main focus of Rotary's efforts.

Current Projects

District Governor Ken McDonald from District 9820 has advised that Rotarians from within his District have immediately got involved with numerous hands on projects in support of the recovery. They are manning many barbeques and community shelters in support of the volunteers and those affected. District 9820's Centenary House in Traralgon has been offered by their Committee of Management as an accommodation venue for the displaced. The Rotary Club of Bairnsdale through its President Elect, Peter Saul has made his Alpaca Farm available for agistment purposes. Members in the area are supporting the farming community with fodder for animals from their properties. The Eco Lodge on Phillip Island has also offered their accommodation facilities to District 9820, free of charge, to those displaced in this catastrophe. DG Ken also advises that their own emergency fund has been established and is being well supported by the District's Rotary Clubs, local businesses and friends of Rotary.

Promote the Recovery Fund

The rebuilding and recovery phase is a long-term one and will require ongoing promotion and support around the country. Simple forms of promotion such as adding a short message promoting the Bushfire Recovery Fund to your email signature provide a visible and tangible means for people to help us help others.

As with other major disasters, Rotarian volunteers from Victorian Districts will be there helping extensively in the rebuilding and recovery of communities affected by the Victorian bushfires. Plan a Project

Rotary clubs should begin preparing a response immediately - we encourage city clubs to get in touch with local country clubs to partner in their efforts. To avoid unnecessary duplication, we suggest you contact bushfirehelp@rotarydistrict9800.org.au to advise of your likely contribution prior to your undertakings – we will endeavour to let you know of similar efforts and opportunities to partner with other clubs. Below are further proposed aid projects for your consideration which would provide tangible assistance to affected communities.

Some Project Ideas

Typical activities for consideration by the **Combined Rotary Districts Community Services Group** and individual Clubs include:

Work in ravaged areas:

• Clean-up work

Debris resulting from the fires will need to be cleared, transported and disposed of. Shovels, excavation equipment and manpower would be of assistance.

This kind of work needs to be determined by local people and coordinated by them. It needs close management of where, when, equipment, transport, cartage, catering etc. Those assisting are strongly advised to make sure all those assisting in the clean up are wearing suitable masks.

Rebuilding work

Assistance in rebuilding community halls, facilities, monuments, etc., as well as private residences - this will be an extensive task. Building materials, water tanks, fencing, hardware, excavation and clearing equipment, etc will all be required.

Assisting members of the public in rebuilding their homes and assisting in rebuilding infrastructure such as sports grounds, playgrounds, schools, toilets, picnic and/or tourist facilities.

Replanting

Replanting of community and residential gardens. Equipment, seedlings and manpower will be required.

- 1. Private gardens/vegetable gardens
- 2. Public street and park planting
- 3. Farm and rural planting

Emergency Services and Recovery Team Relief

Drink and food stations, temporary accommodation or shelters, pillows, foam mats and blankets, wash-off stations, etc. Additional tea, coffee and cold drinks are likely to be highly appreciated even if SES and other groups have their own resources. Volunteer relief of workers on existing stations might also be of use.

Clothing

Victims will most likely be provided second hand clothing from other aid groups. Vouchers for new clothes may allow victims to begin to purchase their own clothes again.

Household Supplies and Goods

On-site services to assist in shopping, the purchasing of whitegoods and other household essentials as well as the transporting of residents en masse to retail stores may be of some assistance.

Give Blood

Giving blood via the Red Cross is a tangible way to provide support that can save lives.

Assistance With Insurance Paperwork and Administration

Some residents may not know where to begin or how to fully access benefits available to them or complete insurance paperwork. Those Rotarians particularly familiar with insurance claims may be able to set up an assistance booth in conjunction with major insurers providing the paperwork and resources to get claims underway ASAP.

Food and Grocery Supplies

Again vouchers or donations to general funds may be preferable to supplies to enable those affected to purchase what they require.

Burns Unit Assistance

Meals, offers of temporary accommodation for family members, pillows, blankets and personal care for family members waiting with patients, offer of showers or amenities, etc. The Alfred Hospital is attending to the bulk of the burns victims.

Wildlife

Assisting volunteer veterinarians and veterinarian nurses in their tremendous support and care for our wildlife. We can help these great people to continue their great work by raising funds for necessary medicines and equipment.

Just Some Of The Efforts So Far...

- The Rotary Club of Brunswick have already put in place a program to raise \$10,000 through member donations, with additional plans also in place.
- Like GrainCorp (who have provided a corporate donation of \$25,000), many other Australian businesses have pledged donations to the Bushfire Recovery Fund.
- Many individual Rotarians have arranged pay deductions with their employers who transfer the donation direct to the Bushfire Recovery Fund.
- The Rotary Club of Eaglehawk, its own region and members hit extensively by the fires, has responded to a request from the City of Greater Bendigo to conduct a Community Day BBQ for the public on Wednesday 18th February. They report that another club in their cluster will further assist them with the donation of six vehicles to bushfire victims on this day, while The Rotary Club of Bendigo has organised the Bendigo Youth Choir to present a public concert at the Capitol Theatre with corporate and public support.
- Rotary District 9600 which covers Brisbane, North of the river, PNG and Solomon Islands have appointed a Bushfire and Flood Victims Coordinator for their district, Paul Fernyhough. Paul has indicated that his intention is to raise at least \$60,000 for this cause and also assist those struck by disaster in the floods affecting North Queensland and The Solomon Islands.
- Rotary Camp Getaway in Axedale, Victoria has been offered as temporary accommodation and a community meeting point for those who have lost their homes and for firefighters requiring respite.
- Our sister clubs overseas have shown their care, with The Rotary Club of Osaka contacting us and promising a donation via its sister Club, The Rotary Club of Melbourne.

Livestock

Purchase of livestock, assistance with fencing, feed and veterinary requirements, etc.

• Toys, schoolbooks, school uniforms, etc for children.

Many children have lost everything – providing them with some small comforts as well as educational means to allow them to continue their studies would be meaningful. Temporary transport to and from school may be required in some instances.

Manual Labour Assistance

Much manual labour is likely to be required. Creation of a centralised volunteer centre at which those willing to volunteer can congregate and be transported to locations requiring labour may be of assistance.

Seating

Many involved will be spending large hours on their feet – seating to allow them to sit down may be beneficial.

Counselling

Those Rotarians who are trained in counselling may want to volunteer their services via Victorian Information Services by phoning 1300 366 356. Doubtlessly those who do volunteer for counselling duties will themselves require debriefing peer support opportunities – those interested in forming an interim Fellowship network can express your interest via bushfirehelp@rotarydistrict9800.org.au

It should be noted that rural people are already badly affected by the poor economic conditions. Consequently it is important to make sure that work done by well intentioned volunteers does not take away work opportunities for rural people.

It is suggested that Rotary try to make it a feature of voluntary work done, that local unemployed people are included in some way.

Just Some Of The Efforts So Far (cont)...

- From the North to the South, Australians don't stop giving - The Rotary Club of Darwin Sunrise has advised that it would be making a donation following its fundraising efforts to help their southern neighbours.
- Rotary District 9930 Leadership in New Zealand has thoughtfully passed on details of District 9800's Bushfire Recovery Fund to all members in District 9930, enabling them to channel donations to our efforts.
- District 9630 have reported back that a public collection is underway, with Toowoomba region Presidents meeting to arrange action through a coordinated assistance program.

There are many more clubs and districts that have already begun to send through their donations, details of projects, encouragement and offers of assistance - over the coming months your support will no doubt prove invaluable.

Asking What Is Required

ShelterBox And The Victorian Bushfires

Victorian Government responds to ShelterBox Australia's offer of aid

The Department of Human Services requested an initial deployment of 50 ShelterBoxes – 20 to Whittlesea and 30 to Kinglake. Arrangements are being made now and ShelterBox Response Team [SRT] members might assist with the deployments.

The Department believes tents will be erected on community sports fields and on sites where homes once stood, and say that the multi-fuel stoves will also be of vital assistance. Many people want to be on their property, especially as there is some looting.

After the deployment has been made, the Department will assess the need for more boxes – they are aware that we have immediate access to 200 in storage in Melbourne. We are sure that Rotarians in the affected areas will also be available to assist as the Department of Human Services guides the deployments.



This is Australia's greatest peace-time tragedy. With more than 5,000 made homeless, ShelterBox Australia is pleased to be able to provide some assistance to our fellow Australians.

Background to the ShelterBox Australia response

On Saturday evening – as the enormity of this tragedy was becoming known – Jenni Heenan, ShelterBox Australia General Manager contacted State MP Rob Hudson and Red Cross Australia and offered ShelterBox aid. The response this morning from Department of Human Services is a result of the contact by Jenni with Rob Hudson who conveyed our offer to State Government Ministers. ShelterBox Australia has been and remains in contact with the Rotary District Governors in the affected areas who are monitoring the situation.







Donating to Bushfire Recovery



An initiative of District 9800 in conjunction with the Victorian Districts

District 9800 has provided two separate ways for Rotary Club members and members of the public to provide donations to our Victorian Bushfire Recovery efforts, allowing for both direct contributions and tax-deductible contributions.

There are two funds available for Rotarians to donate money to in assistance of Bushfire victims.

The first fund established was done so to provide Victorian Rotary Clubs with a centralised fund from which money could flexibly be dispensed to projects run by Victorian Rotary Clubs. With a focus on medium to long term projects, 100% of these funds will be provided to Rotary Clubs and Clusters running relief and community rebuilding projects.

The second fund was set up with the imperative of offering tax deductions to those donors requiring them (which it was quickly ascertained was not an insignificant number of donors.) This fund was set up in partnership with the Lord Mayor's Charitable Foundation (LMCF), with whom Rotary already shares a fantastic partnership. This excellent opportunity allows Rotarians to provide a donation that the LMCF (in consultation with Rotary) is able to distribute to charities registered as Deductible Gift Recipients (DGR's) with the Australia Taxation Office. The opportunity may exist for Rotary to partner with some of these recipient organisations in conducting projects utilising the funds to help Bushfire affected communities.


