ShelterBox made an initial commitment of 400 boxes to assist the earthquake victims in Chengdu City in the Sichuan Province, China. More boxes have now been deployed and consideration is being given to the logistics of sending in ShelterBox tents.

Since 2000, more than 500,000 people in some 40 countries have been assisted by ShelterBox ... and the demand continues to exceed supply.

Friendship Alliance



The 2008 Rotary Anzac Peace Tour (RAPT) was, according to all the participants, the best yet. Nine Rotary couples arrived in Istanbul in mid April and were royally treated by the host club, the Rotary Club of Goksu in District 2420. RAPT is a key feature of an Alliance between D2420 and D9800 finalised during DG Bernie Walshe's year. The Australian delegation was made up of Rotarians from the Rotary Clubs of Mansfield, Kew, Toorak, Hastings, and Central Melbourne Sunrise all in Victoria plus Lavington and Woolgoolga in NSW, and Goondiwindi and Herbert River in Queensland. The Team Leader was Owen Tassicker of the Rotary Club of Balwyn.

On arrival at Istanbul airport the team was met by the Gosku Rotary Club, including Club President Hayati Tiryaki, and taken to their hotel. The next evening after a days touring of Ancient Istanbul, the RAPT team was invited to the weekly meeting of RC Goksu at the usual venue - overlooking the Bosphorus with

breathtaking views! Equally breathtaking was the largest collection of DG's seen for some time; the Current DG, Tashin Tugrul attended along with the incoming DG, the DG Elect and the DG Nominee - such is the standing of the special Alliance between D2420 and D9800.

Two more days were spent visiting major sights in Istanbul assisted by a wonderful professional tour guide Mr Kenan. RC Goksu maintained their excellence in hosting by taking the team on an evening cruise on the Bosphorus and a Sunday BBQ for which the Goksu club partners prepared delicious Turkish cuisine. The RAPT team then travelled to the Gallipoli Peninsular visiting war memorials to the ANZAC, Turkish and British soldiers who lost their lives during the ill fated Dardanelles campaign.

In Gallipoli the team visited a school for the deaf, a school for the blind, met with Mayor Chihat Bingol in his offices, watched some of the festivities that mark the Turkish National Day on April 23rd, and completed the day with a fabulous seafood dinner at a waterfront restaurant. The next day the opportunity was taken to visit the ruins of the ancient city of Troy. Later that evening several of the host club members accompanied the RAPT team to Anzac Cove to see in the dawn of Anzac Day and participate in a very moving dawn service. This was followed by the Australian Memorial Service at the Lone Pine Australian Memorial. A day that will not to be forgotten. Five of the original delegation then went on an extended tour to Ephesus, Cappadokia, Balloon Ascents, Ankara, the Ataturk Mausoleum and then back to Istanbul where they were farewelled by RC Goksu Rotarians.

The tour was considered by all those involved to be a great experience made all the better by the involvement of wonderful Rotarians from both nations. Special thanks go to Rotarians Banu Tulumen Yalcin, of the Rotary Club of Goksu and Owen Tassicker who have led the development of RAPT and the Alliance. Both Districts are keen to see the special relationships that make RAPT possible flourish leading to future visits and further collaboration in International Service projects. To this end an internet based video meeting was held on April 29 between RC Goksu and RC Balwyn with DG John Davis and DGE Jim Studebaker both participating.

Whitelion Bailout

At 17:30 on Friday 30 May, 19 members of the Rotary Brighton Breaker gang entered the Old Melbourne Court House for an experience that will live with them for a lifetime.

On arrival they were fingerprinted, photographed and ushered single file into the mess yard where bread and gruel awaited. The mess yard was crowded with about 120 people, made up of the six inmate gangs. As they stood and ate, the Prison Warden (Glenn Manton) entered the yard and began shouting at a number of different inmates. His performance was aggressive but comical at the same time.

At around 18:10 the real experience began. The inmates moved through different parts of the prison and justice system and experience what juveniles in entering the justice system might endure. It would prove to be a very moving and challenging experience.



First, they were marched from the mess yard and placed in a cell; their first cell experience. Backs to the cell wall, not allowed to speak, the Prison Chaplin (the Whitelion CEO) entered. He shared stories of two young people, their troubled lives and why their experiences had led them to gaol.

The siren sounded – and the inmates were marched from the cell in single file into the exercise yard. Here was a prisoner looking a little distressed. A warden challenged him about his race, skin colour and beard. The young man had been locked up for driving at 2am without a license. His attempt to plead his innocence fell on deaf ears. The fact that he was dark skinned and Middle Eastern would make things hard for him.

Then led to the magistrate's court, where sentence was pronounced; The breakers were split in two and led to cells to contemplate their crimes (and raise some more bail!). At 20:30 all bail money had been raised and inmates were released into the Bail house Rock after party.

The event was a huge success for Whitelion. Initial estimates of money raised on the night are over \$370,000, with the Rotary Brighton Breakers contributing more than \$40,000.00

Whitelion supports young people to build better lives for themselves and helps make our community a more inclusive and safer place.

Each year thousands of young people are disconnected from our community due to abuse and neglect, drug addiction and poverty. These young people have often had horrific life experiences with few positive role models and are caught in a 'cycle of discouragement' that is very hard to break. Many of these young people end up in Out-of-Home Care and in some cases in the Youth Justice System.




From Figaro to Phantom

Rotary Was Founded On Fellowship

Although the first Rotary group was established in 1905, it was in 1928 that Rotary accelerated its international profile through the formation of a number of Rotary Fellowship groups.

Then, as now, Rotary Fellowship groups brought together members from different countries and cultures to interact together and share their particular interest as well as their involvement in the pursuit of Service Above Self. Lifelong friendships are formed as Rotary Fellowships provide another forum for keeping members active in Rotary, sustaining their interest and furthering their commitment.

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There are nearly 100 Rotary Fellowships encompassing a wide variety of vocations and avocations...Travel and hosting, Fine Arts and Antiques, Lawyers, Flying, Cricket, Cycling, Home Exchange, Accountants, Scouting, Doll Lovers, Caravanning, Football, Yachting and, more recently, IT enthusiasts. The list is almost endless.

The full list of the fellowships and their contacts can be found on the Rotary International website. All these fellowship groups serve as a way to extend international fellowship, friendship and service. In addition to offering Rotarians an opportunity to share their passion, many individual fellowship groups enable members to use their hobbies or skills to serve others.

This year, John Steven from the Rotary Club of Camberwell is the World's President of the International Travel and Hosting Fellowship group (ITHF).

Also on the international executive are the Vice President South West Australia Russell Dale, and VP Joy Dale who is the Director of Membership, both from the Rotary Club of Fitzroy. The ITHF exists to promote and facilitate regional, national and international "connections" between its members. The ITHF connections are self paced, subject to individual preference and can coincide with business or pleasure travel. Membership of the ITHF implies a desire and intent to accommodate visitors, however such connections are always subject to the convenience of the hosts. The ITHF is not a bed and breakfast organisation. It is not a home hotel association.

ITHF offers tours led by dedicated and experienced Rotarians which are packaged at the lowest possible cost. These tours most often coincide with a Rotary International Convention and are limited to ITHF members and partners only. The next tour will be a pre-Convention tour of Britain and Ireland prior to the 2009 Birmingham Convention from 6 - 19 June, this tour will be jointly led by our own John Steven, for more information on ITHF and the tour of Britain and Ireland go to their web site. www.ithf.org.

Another fellowship group close to heart is the Rotary Cricket Fellowship (IFCR), established in a majority of cricket playing countries. Formally established at the 1993 RI Convention in Melbourne, its first members were Australia, New Zealand and India. World festivals have been held at Fordingbridge (England 1994) Chennai (India 1999) Christchurch, (New Zealand 2001), the Hunter Valley of New South Wales in 2004 and most recently Colombo (Sri Lanka 2007). These have been occasions where a steadily growing number of Rotary cricketers have come together for fun and fellowship. The Colombo Festival featured players from England, India, New

Zealand, Sri Lanka, South Africa and Pakistan.

For those who attended the Shepparton District Conference you would remember Poet Don McQueen. Don has a passion for cricket and established the Hume and Hovell Cricket ground at Strath Creek, which should be a must for all followers of cricket to visit. Don is a past president of the IFCR and has played and led teams overseas. Don is also a member of the RC of Yea. 

As issues that will not go away, but which will instead generate significant change across the economy, the realisation is there that Greenhouse solutions align with organisational growth and are key to business planning. As economic mechanisms such as emissions trading are implemented nationally, it is important to keep up to date with the strategic information such as the Garnaut Climate Change Review (draft scheduled to be released early July) to understand the economic impacts of climate change and the options for government policy response.



While Rotarians have an opportunity to guide, influence and implement measures to reduce the impact of controllable environmental change, we should also recognise that adaptation to the unavoidable impacts of climate change creates significant opportunities. Unavoidable impacts of climate change include increased intensity of extreme weather events (wind, flooding, stormsurge, bushfire), accelerated degradation of assets (buildings and facilities) and resource demand pressures (water, power).



The Year That Was

As I look back on the photos of the District Change Over 2007 at Melrose it is almost hard to believe that 12 months have come and gone and we are about to embark on a new Rotary year. On the other hand however, when I look at my diary, I wonder how we have fitted so much into only 12 months!!

In our Strategic Plan 2007-2008 I did set some specific goals which I wanted to measure at the end of this Rotary year.

Membershipmy aim was to have a minimum net gain of 140 members in our District with a target of 3000 members by the end the Rotary year. While not an impossible task it certainly was a challenge. I am pleased to report that we have exceeded the net gain of 140 members, but we are unlikely to achieve the 3000 member target by year's end. We will, however, complete the year with either the highest or second highest percentage increase in membership of any Rotary District in Australia. This has been a magnificent effort by the 49 clubs who either held or grew their membership this year, with the support of District Membership Advisor Mel Gray and his hard working Membership Committee.

Foundation ... This has been another success story. Our support to the foundation, at all levels, this year has been outstanding. What a great experience it was to be involved with the very successful GSE team from D5650 and our own excellent outbound group D9800. There was our sponsorship of Ambassadorial scholars, Matching and District simplified grants and, of course, the rock solid financial support through D9800 Clubs. Your support to 'our Foundation' this year has been wonderful. To one and all – "Thank you". It is likely that of the 39 Districts in Zones 7 & 8, District 9800 will be in the top 3 in both the total dollars provided and the dollars per member. Based on progressive figures to the end of April, topping one, or both, of these categories is possible.

This year we introduced 3 full day meetings for members of the District Management Group. They were held at Ison House, Camp Getaway and International House. I believe these meetings allowed sufficient time for each member to raise problems or contentious issues for discussion, prior to a plan of action being approved to solve the issues in question.

We have entered into an agreement with District 2980 in the Pondicherry area of India to implement five matching grants worth a total of \$210,000. The Pondicherry area in India is the area that was devastated by the Tsunami in Dec 2005.

It is pleasing to see the installation of the Royce Abbey Collection in the new modern display cabinets in the New Royce Abbey Room. There is still some fine tuning to be undertaken on the display which will be completed over the next few weeks.

The Rotary D9800 Conference at Shepparton was certainly one of the highlights of the year. My sincere thanks and congratulations to the Conference Chair Lawrence Atley and his hard working team for making the Conference a great weekend of Rotary knowledge and fellowship.

The introduction this year of a leadership development course under the banner of Potential Rotary Leadership Seminar was also well received and I am pleased this type of training will continue into the 2008-9 Rotary year. My thanks to my District Trainers PDG Judy Nettleton and Vanda Mullen for the excellent work they did in preparing the Presidents 2007-8 for their year of office. I'm sure the achievements won this year were due, in no small way, to the thorough preparation of the main Club and District office bearers.

The Rotary year 2007-8 would not have progressed without the dedicated efforts and hard work of the District Board and the District Management Group. I could not have wished for a more conscientious and hard working group of Rotarians, thank you for your Service above Self.

35 Years Of Service In Laverton Point Cook

The Rotary Club of Laverton Point Cook is about to celebrate its 35th anniversary and to celebrate the event has undertaken an assessment of its contribution to the community over that time.

The fundraising activities and financial contribution of the club over 35 years has resulted in charitable donations and expenditure totalling \$664,000 which in 2008 dollar terms is equivalent to \$1,086,000. This doesn't take into account the value of more than 25,000 hours of voluntary effort put in by club members. More than 120 local clubs, schools and organisations have shared in the bulk of these donations with 45 overseas aid projects also assisted.

Locally the club has undertaken major projects such as providing a house and ongoing assistance to the Laverton Community Centre, the creation of the 128 acre Laurie Emmins Reserve in Laverton North,

restoring the 121 year old Laverton Old School, running professional Athletic Carnivals and Weerama Triathlons, running an inaugural Blues Music Festival at the Point Cook Homestead and building a major new playground at the Point Cook Coastal Park for completion in the near future.

A host of other service projects in the local area have been undertaken on a regular annual basis. For example, sponsoring local youth to attend leadership and science camps, provision of regular scholarships to schools, holding Australia Day events, Laverton Citizen of the Year awards and assisting needy citizens in many ways. Thousands of dollars have been raised by the club for major appeals such as Ash Wednesday \$32,000, Royal Children's Hospital

Heart Throb program \$29,000, the Bone Marrow Appeal \$23,500 and Ovarian Cancer research \$16,000.
