The play is written by actor/broadcaster Roland Rocchiccioli and will star himself and Glenda Linscott (the one-time bikie chick from TV's "Prisoner").

The City of Melbourne is supporting the venture and proceeds go to Melbourne charities.

The play follows one couple, Rupert and Diana, through poignant love letters probing the pain of separation during the war and the heart- wrenching struggle to return to normality afterwards. The letters tell a story of unfolding romance, and later, breath-taking honesty as the man and woman confront their human weaknesses.

Rocchiccioli says, "This is a story which proves – above all else – The Greatest is Love." The play was launched at Brighton, UK, to critical acclaim. Leading UK theatre director Sean Mathias says, "I turned every page of the script with excitement and fascination. I wanted to know every move, every thought, every detail about these two people."

Eat Well Play Well Learn Well



Footy Nuts "Eat Well, Play Well, Learn Well" - Rotary's Nourish Our Kids Project.

It is paramount that we need to improve the nutrition of indigenous children and their families in remote communities. The children have great eye ball coordination but no stamina on the footy fields or in the school room...nourishment is what they need!

Four Melbourne-based Rotary* clubs are partnering with 'Red Dust Role Models' to launch Rotary's 'Nourish Our Kids' project. Our aim is to help improve the nutrition of indigenous children and their families in remote communities.

The key is this project is increasing the range and sales of nutritious foods in the local community stores.

The first wave of this project involves an innovative range of nut products, branded "Footy Nuts". And the first community to embrace the project is Nganambala, a small community about 300kms south-west of Darwin.

The simple idea is to encourage the kids and their families to swap the chips and processed snack foods they currently eat, for more nutritious nut snacks as well as to add nuts to some of their favourite recipes such as damper.

The 'Footy Nuts' range comprises three nut snacks - oven-roasted almonds, oven-roasted cashews and oven-roasted mixed nuts - and two 'damper mixes' — chopped almonds and walnuts and chopped almonds, walnuts & sultanas. Packaged in convenient 200 gm tub packs, they will be competitively priced with equivalent packets of chips and chocolate bars.

The packaging of these nuts has initially been sponsored by Scalzo Foods, Rotary's "Nourish Our Kids" project was developed from the very beginning in close consultation with the school principal from Nganambala and with the leaders of the Red Dust Role Models as 'ownership' of the project by each local community will be essential for its effectiveness. Also the community was consulted in relation to nut allergies.

One way of trying to excite the kids in our remote indigenous communities to make the swap from chips and chocolates to more nutritious and healthy nut snacks is through the active encouragement of their footy heroes.



"Footy Nuts" is proud to have the enthusiastic support of some the AFL's best indigenous footballers as well as the Hawthorn Football Club's coach, Alstair Clarkson. They all know that to play well, we need to eat well.

"Footy Nuts" is also delighted to announce that the Aboriginal Literacy Foundation is a founding sponsor because we know that if we can improve the quality of our kids' nutrition, they can learn more effectively in class,

We will be taking the message of our footy stars to our indigenous communities to give 'Footy Nuts' a go so that we can 'EAT WELL, PLAY WELL & LEARN WELL'.

Rotary is making a 'World of Difference'

Phnom Penh Rotarians Rithy Lay and President Peter Gray provided me with a report on the 12th September about a remote village we are assisting in Kampong Speu province, Cambodia.

It makes me reflect on the important things in life. Through a "World of Difference" project I met the people in the villages back in October 2011. 800 people starving, 6 deaths the previous week from Cholera, Typhoid fever and Malaria which were endemic in the three villages which are within 3 kms of each other.

The simple things – crops, safe water, hygiene, nutrition. They sound so basic and it's terrible that in Cambodia they are only enjoyed by around 10% of the population. The other 90% of subsistence farmers are at the whim of the weather and live from day to day.

Now these 800 people now have these basic,

important simple things. Three dams (courtesy RC Melbourne South, RC Chelsea, RC Holroyd and WOD tour participants) provide water for aquaculture and irrigation. Rain water harvesting, a solar electricity trial (courtesy RC Brighton) and a toilet provide safe water and a start in respect to sanitation.

Crop seed, medication, water filtration and basic housing providing shelter complete the picture so far. The people are healthy and happy.

In Rithy's words "Two years ago, if you came to visit Bossala village you might think that it is one of the empty isolated villages in Kampong Speu province and the people here are known as the illiterate. The children walk about 15km across the river and landmine fields to get to school without proper school uniforms or even without breakfast.

Hundreds of children gave up their school and do nothing in the village instead of helping their parents' season work on the rice paddy.

Today you see the school is erected in the centre of the village which is called "Bossala Primary School" and it will play a key role to providing education, to not only the children in Bossala village but also the children in other neighboring villages, we expect more than 500 children to come to this school."

This school will be fitted out, teachers trained and employed and children provided with school supplies. The people in these villages are working hard – collaborating in partnership with Rotarians from more than 6 clubs to make a future for their children. This for me, is a very important thing in life.

Safari 2012: Why What Goes on Safari Should Not Always Stay on Safari

Emanuel Tumino, Rotary Club of Footscray was one of 3 Leaders for the 2012 Safari, the others being Rotarians Mary Parks and Geoff Asher. In 2012, the bus stopped early on a Saturday morning for a toilet/coffee break at a place called Julia Creek along the Flinders Highway, in the desert and deep in the outback of Queensland. The "town" had a few shops, a handful of houses and a population of perhaps 100 people - a desolate place, where Australia Post had the only cappuccino machine in "town".

Emanuel walked up the road along with Geoff Asher to get their coffee from Australia Post. They noticed a teenage girl sitting on a street seat holding a puppy and it appeared that she just sat there watching occasional cars drive through the town. She overhead Emanuel and Geoff laughing about the need to go to Australia Post for a coffee and she obviously wanted a conversation badly because she chimed in with a comical comment about having to go to the ladies dress shop to get a haircut! Introduction to Rotary Youth Exchange

On the way back, with coffees in hand, Emanuel and Geoff stopped to talk to her. Her name was Courtney. Her dad worked in the mines and she was schooled through 'School of the Air'. She was one of only 2 teenagers in the entire "town". There was a small primary school, no secondary school, no organised sport and she had virtually no face to face contact with other teenagers. Her Saturday mornings seemed to consist of sitting on that street seat, waiting and watching passing traffic.

A perfect match

Geoff and Emanuel explained to Courtney the Rotary Youth Exchange Program and the Safari and invited her to come to the bus and meet the international students. She eagerly accepted the invitation and revelled in the





opportunity to engage with peers, swap Facebook details and the like. For the bare 2 or 3 minutes available to her, it was very obvious that she was in her element and that she had been starved of face to face contact with students her own age.

When it came time to leave after those few small minutes, the students said their goodbyes and boarded the bus. Emanuel was the last to board and turned to Courtney, only to see that she was in tears. That moment brought home the sense of sheer isolation that Courtney must have felt. Of course, that had an impact on Emanuel, Geoff and all the students.

The Leaders thought they would see what they could do about getting support for Courtney for a potential international exchange and stayed in touch with her via Facebook. When it came down to it, her family was simply unable to afford it. During the last 12 months, Courtney moved to a place further along the Flinders Highway, called Maxwelton, which is even more remote and desolate and consisted of nothing more than a toilet/bus stop on the highway.

2013 Safari Stopover

Whilst stopped again in 2013 at Julia Creek, Emanuel told the story to this year's Safari students and asked if they wanted an opportunity to meet her. To a tee they all agreed and so a text message was sent to Courtney to say they were on their way. As there was nothing to see at Maxwelton and the Safari travellers all being half asleep on the bus, they drove straight past the bus stop where Courtney was anxiously waiting. Luckily, one of the other Leaders said they had seen someone frantically waving at the bus from the side of the road as it drove past and they realised they had driven straight past Courtney! As there was no room to turn the bus, they had to drive on for 5 kilometres until they could turn the bus around and head back to the bus stop.

Meanwhile Courtney had walked back to her house in tears, but she was trying to call on her mobile. She finally got through to Geoff saying, 'You drove past me'. Of course, Geoff told her the bus was turning around to come back. Her father later told how he had never seen her run so fast across the paddocks back to the bus stop to wait for the return of the bus.

They spent half an hour with Courtney. The students





interacted with her enthusiastically. She had a great time and had all 33 students eating out of her hands. She explained that she was still doing School of the Air and had a part time job cattle mustering. Her personal contact with others was limited to her father, her step mother and mainly adult males. She said she would love to go on exchange, but that her parents could not afford it.

Heading to Brazil

This time, things became a little different. The Leaders actively pursued Rotary District 9550 (Mount Isa, Tennant Creek etc) being the Rotary District within which she lives. After many phone calls and ongoing communications, Courtney has been accepted into the Youth Exchange Program and selected to go to Brazil for a year in January 2014.

Finances remain an issue for her, although some financial support is being offered by Rotary District 9550, being her own Rotary District. In addition, Courtney is saving as much as she can from her part time cattle mustering work and is also looking for extra work where available — of course this is particularly difficult given her isolation at a remote outback outpost. Anything more that can be done by Rotary would most certainly be appreciated.



In essence, this is a simple story about the opportunities Rotary can offer to our own, through coordination and involvement of a number of Districts. A few Rotarians have committed funds to arrange for Courtney to travel to Melbourne during the first week of the September holidays and to visit a few Rotary Clubs in "the big smoke" before heading back and getting ready for a year that will change her life.







kitchen redevelopment at Camp Getaway

Camp Getaway (Rotary D9800) is Rotary's biggest asset in District 9800. Located at Axedale, 20 minutes from Bendigo, the camp has been an entire D9800 project since 2000, when it was handed over to District by RC Bendigo. The camp has been redeveloped with the prime aim of providing camping opportunities for people of all abilities, with a focus on children. Increasingly it is also being used for D9800 activities such as Youth Exchange camps and MUNA. Over \$1m has been donated by clubs, government and charities to transform termite infested buildings into a modern camp of single unit and dormitory accommodation - some would say '5 Star Camping'!

The District Committee overseeing Camp Getaway has been working hard over the last two years to have the old kitchen at the camp replaced with a modern amenity that will meet all current needs and standards. D9800 clubs and generous individuals have donated over \$145,000 for the project, which has commenced under a staged building permit. If District clubs who have not donated, could contribute further funding of up to \$20,000, then that would see the fundraising total met.

Many hurdles have had to be overcome with the kitchen replacement project, including Planning Permits, EPA requirements, preparation of detailed plans, etc. However, in usual Rotary spirit, the work towards replacement would not be as far advanced as it is without the magnificent volunteer support of individual Rotarians and clubs who have contributed countless hours to the preparatory work of preparing plans, obtaining permits, undertaking site

preparation works, drainage works, equipment procurement, relocation of buildings and plant, erection of buildings associated with the kitchen including storage facilities, vehicle parking provision and other support.

Practical support for the site preparation works and associated building construction has been phenomenal, with clubs such as Eaglehawk, Keilor, Bendigo South, Bendigo Sandhurst, Nth Balwyn, Bendigo, Bendigo Strathdale and others providing valuable expertise in a true 'hands-on' role to see the project progress to the commencement of the main kitchen building. As the project operates on a staged building permit, the last stage of the construction of the actual kitchen building will commence just as soon as plans are approved by the building surveyor. The final version of the plans were submitted in early September, and approval is expected shortly. In the mean time, work does not stop on the preparatory and site works required for the new kitchen. Working bees in August, September and October have seen significant progress in this regard. The following photos give some indication of the scope of activities tackled.

Of course, whilst the kitchen replacement project is underway it is still 'business as usual' for the many groups who have booked and continue to book the camp for a multitude of purposes. From disability support organisations booking camps for school aged children to church groups, family reunions, business seminars or our own D9800 uses for MUNA and Youth Exchange, there is hardly a weekend in the next 10 months where a booking is available. Mid-week bookings are strongly encouraged, with on-site caretaker, Dowell Mitchell









keen to assist campers to enjoy the great facilities. (Of course, Dowell balances this with his Presidential year at RC Bendigo Sandhurst).

Cook Islands Business Training

A Cook Islands (CI) business man was smiling proudly as he showed me his new web site at the conclusion of the three day workshop on web design. In fact all the participants in this workshop emerged with smiles on their faces which reflected their new confidence in what was previously a difficult challenge for them. This workshop facilitated by Rotarian John Blanchard of the Rotary Club of Wendouree, was one component of the Rotary Business Week which has now been conducted over the last five consecutive years.

Each year Wendouree in partnership with the Rotary Club of Rarotonga, the Business Trade and Investment Board, Allan and Shirley Cann of Cann Business Enterprises and the Rotary Club of Woodend, deliver to participants a free, one week intensive business training program specifically for the small business community of the CI.

As well as web design, this year's program included a workshop on soils management, designed to assist farmers create healthier crops from healthier soils and one on one



mentoring covering various business issues.

The thrust of the Rotary Business Week is to assist small businesses in the CI to become more productive and hence more competitive which inevitably improves the standard of living of the whole CI community. The topics for each year are selected by the CI partners. This is done deliberately to ensure that the

program is meeting the immediate needs of the small business community.

For example this year and last, workshops were conducted on how to assist farmers develop healthier crops. This was very much in line with the CI governments program to reduce the need for the community to import stable food products which could otherwise be grown locally. Accordingly, Melissa Caffrey a soil scientist from Swan Hill, Victoria was recruited to deliver this most important training.

It is planned that all partners will continue this most important and innovative International Service project in the Cook Islands. Also, there is currently, ongoing research into expanding this program into other Pacific Island countries, providing the opportunity for other Rotary Clubs to participate as well.

It was a great occasion and it seemed the whole village was present. The official delegation was welcomed with traditional chanting, dancing and drummers, all in traditional dress and head gear. Lots of speeches were followed by a great feast for around 600 guests. RI and RC Port Melbourne with our donors and Daryl Mills from RC Dili were all mentioned and thanked for our contributions.

Robyn and myself took time out from the speeches to visit the various projects funded by RCPM in the village, such as the new toilet and furnishings at the Balibo 5 Kindergarten, the new toilet block and computers at the Community Learning Centre, and the restored Balibo Portuguese Fort and Fort House, where RCPM has provided funds, professional consultancy, a commercial kitchen and museum exhibits. We did not get to see our donated furnishings at the Balibo Convent.

All these projects in Balibo, have been delivered in partnership with R.C. Dili and in particular with the help of Daryl Mills A.O. who has been the project manager. We also received much help from Donations in Kind. We also visited the Leo-Lima Primary School and talked to the kids and teachers, including headmaster, Mr.



Adriano Suarez, who, just like teacher Maria Lake at the Balibo Kindergarten, pointed out that their children were still extremely disadvantaged and pleaded with us not to be forgotten when planning our projects. We assured them that we had every intention to support them into the future and came back with requests for; 44 children's desks, 5 teachers desks, 5 blackboards, filing cabinets, exercise books, etc. etc.

All in addition to the recently shipped 140 'Return to School' bags, computers and other stuff. As a Rotarian, the trip served to confirm once more that our club is relevant, needed, and appreciated in Balibo; but our job is not done, to really achieve a higher educational outcome, it must remain an ongoing and long term commitment to the children and the larger Balibo Community.

At a personal level, it was a great experience, an eye opening adventure really, and I am certain that Robyn, Michael, Peter and myself will not easily forget it.

Royce Abbey Award

MILESTONE

2013 marks the 25th anniversary of Royce Abbey's induction as Rotary International World President. Royce joined the Rotary Club of Essendon in 1954, was Club President in 1963-64 and served as District Governor in 1969-70. He held Rotary's highest office in 1988-89.

In recognition of Royce's significant achievements the District Governors of 1988-89 established The Royce

and Jean Abbey Endowed Fund as part of the Rotary Foundation. The earnings of the Fund have been used to pay for people from poorer Asia Pacific countries to undertake practical agricultural training in Australia in areas such as food production, forestry and animal husbandry, and the successful candidates then return home to impart the knowledge gained to their own

communities. The scholarships are now administered by the Royce and Jean Abbey Vocational Training Team Committee, chaired by David Abbey, Royce and Jean's son and Past President of the Rotary Club of Shepparton.

To further acknowledge Royce's longterm contribution and dedication to Rotary, PP Roger Leask of the Rotary Club of Essendon created the Royce Abbey Award. Since 2004, this award has been presented to Rotarians who show enthusiasm and commitment to Rotary just as Royce Abbey has done throughout his life.

Initially intended for members with less than five years service, the

criteria have now been amended to include Rotarians of longer standing who continue to commit themselves to helping others. When an award is made, the conferring Rotary Club contributes AUD1000 to the Royce and Jean Abbey Endowed Fund assisting with the provision of

further scholarships.

A milestone was reached in July this year when President Jane Cox of the Rotary Club of Geelong Central presented the 200th Royce Abbey Award to Rotarian Richard Oakley.

The current count is

213 awards made to Rotarians in Australia, Indonesia and the Philippines which signifies a contribution of \$213,000 towards scholarship funds.

At the Rotary Club of Essendon's mid-year Presidential changeover, a very surprised Roger Leask was presented with a stylish plaque to mark the success of the Royce Abbey award. In his congratulatory remarks, President Grant Sheldon highlighted Roger's initiative in his creation and tireless promotion of the award, its significant benefit to the Rotary Foundation and our Pacific and Asian neighbours as well as the fine example Royce continues to set for the next generation of Rotarians. Well done Roger!



Batman Cluster

AG TONY WELLS

The Batman Cluster includes a mixture of eight clubs based loosely around the Melbourne CBD, some mature clubs and some recently chartered clubs. All demonstrate commitment to the spirit of Rotary, reflecting our core values of service, fellowship, integrity, diversity and leadership.

Batman currently includes the largest and oldest Club in Australia, RC Melbourne with about 230 members and an enormous range of projects and the smallest club in the District, RC Docklands, with less than a handful.

Rotary Programs

Rotary projects originating in the Cluster vary widely, ranging for example from the Paul Harris Breakfast (RC Central Melbourne Sunrise) and the International Women's Day Breakfast (RC Albert Park) to typical Rotary service programs.

An example, from a smaller club in RC Port

Melbourne (16 members), is its partnership in the Balibo House Trust in Timor Leste - a program to improve educational and sanitary outcomes in the village of Balibo, where five Australian journalists died during East Timor's struggle for indepen-



dence

The Rotary program has supplied furniture for the Balibo Kindergarten, a new toilet block for the Community Learning Centre and has restored the 350 year old Balibo Portuguese



Fort. The result is the development of tourism based skills, employment and micro-enterprise opportunities.

RC Central Melbourne undertook an innovative and entrepreneurial approach to fund raising by producing the Australian premier of a play

"The Greatest is Love". It was ultimately successful, but the scale of the production reflected a risk for the Club. At the final curtain the outcome matched DG Ross Butterworth's challenge: "Don't be afraid to fail – be afraid not to try".

Challenges in Batman

Challenges in the Batman Cluster have included bedding down the Rotary E-Club.

There is no traditional model or structure in D9800 for an E-Club to draw on and less experienced Rotarians in the Club have been mentored by of RC Melbourne.

The E-Club Board meets regularly and, as might be expected, there has been debate about the directions the Club should take – the functionality of the website for example and the mix between online activity and personal contact between members and engagement in service projects.

The Club is working to develop its own culture and a sense of direction and intends to proceed to Club Visioning facilitation.

General Comment

A feature of Cluster activities are joint meetings between RCs Melbourne South, Port Melbourne and Albert Park on a regular basis and joint fund raising efforts between RCs Melbourne South and Port Melbourne.

Rotary seeks to connect with the community and RC Southbank has a program called 'Synergy' which is a new type of networking program for people of all occupations, designed to help build high quality connection for long term mutual benefit and service.

This sort of activity illustrates a collective approach within the Cluster as Rotary seeks to provide Service Above Self.





Paul Harris Breakfast Packs out RACV



The 17th Floor of the RACV Club on Bourke St, Melbourne, was packed out as 238 Rotarians and friends gathered for the 21st annual Paul Harris Breakfast, run by the Rotary Club of Central Melbourne-Sunrise (RCCMS). Numerous Paul Harris Fellows attended the breakfast, held on Wednesday November 13 with all up 23 Rotary clubs from District 9800 represented.

The breakfasts are dedicated to the Rotary Foundation and recognise the achievements of our Paul Harris Fellows. This year's event raised more than \$9,000 for Foundation programs, including \$3,300 from raffles and \$1,750 from a large-scale auction - the major items being a Mercedes-Benz Brighton Driving Experience and a Qantas Flight Training Experience for three people.

RCCMS President Doug Robertson welcomed District Governor Ross Butterworth and Director, District Foundation Committee, PDG John Wigley, DGE Murray Verso and DGN Julie Mason.

Guest speaker was the Hon. Justice Chris Maxwell, Judge of the Supreme Court of Victoria and President of the Court of Appeal. He spoke on 'Reflections on Victoria's Human Rights Charter - Has It Made a Difference?'

He explained the relationship of Victoria's Charter to citizens, government and the legislature, and subtleties involved when judges find conflicts between the Charter and specific laws and prosecutions. Large numbers of case studies have evolved, mostly dealt with out of court, between individuals, departments and local councils.

He instanced one such case where State law put the onus of proof on a woman to show she was unaware that her boyfriend had kept drugs in her fridge, resulting in her conviction for drug possession and trafficking. Normally a defendant can stand mute and require prosecutors to prove guilt. "We made a declaration that the onus provisions of the Drugs Act were incompatible with the Charter of Human Rights," he said. This finding caused the issue to be referred back to Parliament to see if legislation should be amended or retained in the public interest. "We don't write laws, we only interpret them," he said.

In question time, he said it would not be effective to enshrine the charter in the State Constitution, which was itself an Act of Parliament. To try to put the charter into the Federal Constitution might

lead to unexpected

rigidities since the Charter could well be expected to evolve with the temper of the times, rather than be adapted by referendum.

Those present were encouraged to look up the Charter and to read and understand the rights, particularly as it may well apply when undertaking activates as Rotarians and community leaders.


There is no president; full or patched members vote at meetings where minutes are taken by the club secretary.



ROTARY CLUBS TAKE ACTION FOR TYPHOON-RAVAGED PHILIPPINES

Photo Credit: Photo courtesy of Rotary District 3860, Phillipines Rotary clubs around the world are pledging emergency aid to communities in central Philippines after last week's massive typhoon flattened entire coastal towns and villages, killed thousands of people, and displaced nearly 600,000 more.

The situation remains dire as widespread destruction has made food, water, and medicine scarce in remote areas affected by Typhoon Haiyan, the strongest storm to make landfall on record.

Rotary President Ron Burton is urging our 34,000 clubs worldwide to continue to assist storm victims.

"I know we all want to help. I am urging our clubs to take action to provide emergency aid now and begin planning for the future when we can help rebuild homes, schools, and businesses," says Burton. "We are in the business of helping people in need."

Rotary partner ShelterBox has committed aid for 4,000 families in the form of emergency shelter and other relief assistance.

Such disasters are "exactly why we entered into our partnership with ShelterBox," says Burton. "It gives Rotary members worldwide the opportunity to respond immediately and in a very meaningful way to the life-threatening conditions faced by the people of the Philippines."

For nearly 100 years, Rotary clubs in the Philippines have been creating positive change in their communities. The first Philippine Rotary club was formed in Manila in 1919. Today, more than 800 Rotary clubs throughout the Philippines give members the chance to make a difference at home and around the globe.

Rotary's work to eradicate polio, our top priority, began in the Philippines. In 1979, Rotary funded the immunization of six million children with the oral polio vaccine. Based largely on the success there, the World Health Assembly authorized the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in which Rotary is a spearheading partner.

Rotary clubs in the Philippines have

improved water and sanitation, led medical and dental missions, created literacy programs, and participated in reforestation plantings. When a 7.1 magnitude earthquake struck central Philippines in September, clubs were there to bring aid to those in need.

"Rotary members often are both first-responders and rebuilders when major disasters strike because clubs are present in every corner of the world," Burton says. "We continue with recovery efforts long after international relief agencies have gone because Rotary clubs are part of the communities we serve."
