2018 District Conference Wrap

This year's District Conference has ended with outstanding results and feedback for the organisers, the Rotary Club of Balwyn lead by District Governor Peter Frueh, Anne Frueh, Di Gillies and a stalwart team.

Organising and running a District Conference is a 2 and a half year journey and one of the first responsibilities set a District Governor Nominee. From choosing the location deadlines kept the team on task—an advertisement for inclusion in the 2017 conference booklet, a flyer and marketing material for the 2017 conference marketplace, a website to set and registrations to open. With nine months to go, they were well down the road. The team expanded almost exponentially, and the pace picked up as detailed planning progressed—tours, speakers, presenters, food, beverages, logistics, budget, uniforms.

With two months to go, everything was on schedule. The Balwyn team arrived on mass to a sunny, windless Warrnambool delivering the fun filled, inspiring conference that they had promised. Approximately one million dollars was injected into the local economy. "Days for Girls", a North Balwyn sewing group earned \$1,900 for making the uniforms. \$1,500 was raised towards the Maremma Penguin Project. Bonds were created with the Warrnambool Central Rotary Club. Lunches were sent to the fire evacuation centre in Warrnambool. Almost 20,000 meals for disaster aid were packed using the For-A-Meal method.

Many thanks to District 9800 stalwarts Peter Shephard and Ian Hovey, who have vast experience and provided invaluable help and expertise behind the scenes.

To all members of the Rotary Club of Balwyn, congratulations on a magnificent Conference. Feedback has been overwhelmingly positive from all and congratulations must go to Conference Organiser Di Gillies. Coordinators Anne Frueh, Clarke Ballard, Anthea Rutter, Bill Goodwin, Brian Pollock, Phillip Lambers, Brian Matheson, Sue King, Kevin Walsh, Kevin McQualter, Peter O'Brien, Andrew Miles, David Jones and Murray Wilkinson for their work.

Bob Fels receives Outstanding Service Award



On 13 March, Governor Linda Dessau and her husband Mr Tony Howard hosted an afternoon reception for Ian at Government House. The Governor, an Honorary Member of the Rotary Club of Melbourne, invited every Rotary Club in Victoria to nominate 4 Rotarians as guests.

Almost 900 Rotarians filled the ballroom and created quite a buzz! Rotarians then enjoyed a sunny autumn day mingling on the terrace lawn. All the State Rooms were opened so that the guests could experience the beauty of Government House.

This Vice-Regal recognition on such a scale is a first for Rotary in Victoria. Securing a visit by a Rotary International President requires advance, flexible planning which the Rotary Club of Melbourne initiated 22 months ago.

As Rotary International President, Ian travels the world receiving invitations from thousands of Clubs and Districts as well as overseeing Rotary's operations so securing a visit is something special.





RI President Ian Riseley on March 14th dedicated a tree at Rotary Park in the Royal Botanical Gardens. He was the 28th RI President to be commemorated in the Rotary Park after Paul Harris planted the first tree in 1936. This is a Brush Box tree and still thriving. Each of the five Australian world Presidents have also commemorated a tree. Ian, with his love of fauna was delighted to unveil a plaque with his name attached to an indigenous *Ficus Platyoda* (native fig), commonly known as a desert fig or rock fig endemic to Central and Northern Australia. It is unusual to have such a fine national specimen so well established in the City of Melbourne. Being such a mature tree, Ian had difficulty giving it a big hug.



Scott Bolton—District 9800 Global Grants Scholar



“I am an educator with a track record of working to further the Rotary Foundation’s goal of improving basic education and literacy in disadvantaged school contexts, and a clear commitment to building a career as a reforming school leader in Australia’s public school system.”

Australia needs a coalition of public school system leaders, committed to improving student outcomes by investing in teaching and school communities

What an inspirational and aspirational goal for the recipient of the 2018 global scholar program.

Scott Bolton was the successful candidate this year. He will receive \$60,000 from Rotary Foundation funds.

It was a joy to be on the panel interviewing Scott and the other very impressive candidates that applied for this enormous pot of money.

We sometimes think that Foundation funds are limited to our club projects and what they achieve, even dare I suggest, only international projects. The global scholars, peace scholars and vocational teams are other important programs.

Scott worked with disadvantaged and migrant students in Australia. He has spent time researching models of teaching. This is where he found his passion for improving education for being at the forefront of leadership. He used an interesting analogy.

Some people buy BMWs and Mercedes cars. They drive them for a few years. At the first sign of trouble they trade them in. Others buy a car. They listen for trouble, check them regularly, fine tune them and maintain them to get the best from them for great performance for a long time. Scott likes to approach the students in his care with the same individual attention.

In Scott’s words

“To achieve these professional goals, I need the knowledge of what is best practice, the skills to put this knowledge into action, and the mentors and partnerships to sustain these efforts over time. The potential to experience a world-leading school leadership development program first-hand is what draws me specifically to Harvard Graduate School of Education: a one year, professionally-focused degree that equips emerging school leaders with the tools needed to lift student outcomes in a diverse range of school contexts. I want to learn from experienced professors who can challenge my assumptions about what it means to both “do” school leadership and “be” a leader, and observe practicing principals in action as they drive evidence-based school reform. In the same way that Rotary’s international community makes it stronger, I want to bring what I learn in an American context back to enhance efforts to address educational disadvantage in our community.”

Scott's initial professional goal is to return to the Australian public school system – first as a Leading Teacher with responsibility for curriculum design & professional development, and then as a Principal turning around educationally disadvantaged public schools. Longer-term, he would like to use his knowledge and experience as a school leader to drive system-level reform. He believes Australia needs its first Lab School, a place where teachers could experiment with and disseminate fresh approaches to teaching and teacher training across the country.

Scott values Rotary. He asked of us the possibility of a Rotary Club helping establish a multicultural cafeteria in the school he returns to work in for the community. Clearly he had thought through wider possibilities for his school community than just the students' education.

Rotary International and District 9800 combined investment is of USD\$60,000 to fund Scott to study at Harvard University. Scott's pledge

"If given the opportunity to work with the Rotary Foundation as a Global Grants Scholar, I would dedicate myself to translating Rotary's investment into tangible improvement in outcomes for the most educationally disadvantaged students in Australia."

What a diverse and wonderful Rotary world this is where Scott is funded to **Make a Difference** in his speciality. He will "**Be The Inspiration**" for sure in 2018.

Vocational Training Team Cambodia 2018

On the 5th of January Audrey Bugeja, Louise Matthews, Matthew Scott and Pat Sourivong left Australia to deliver a two week program to one hundred and forty eight eager teachers from remote village schools in Cambodia.

For the first time the team was joined by a local teacher, Linda Sok, who supported Team Leader Audrey in organising resources, snacks for the program and helping with the interpreters gain knowledge of and confidence in the implementation of the program. This year some translators were local teachers and some had assisted before and the mix ensured that the Training team from Australia were ably assisted by these fabulous people. It is worth noting that this is the second of a two year Global Grant funded literacy based Vocational Training Team initiative and the intention to apply for another Global Grant was dependent upon the outcomes of this program related to impact and sustainability.

Over time Audrey has developed a three stage sequentially based program. Many teachers who complete Stage 1 return to do Stage 2 and then Stage 3. This in itself is a testament to the perceived value of the program. Some excellent feedback was received and that included 98% of the participants maintain that the program was useful, 95% thought that the content was well presented and 83% agreed that the content was easy to follow.



The Vocational Training Group quickly became a cohesive, supportive, and flexible team who engaged participants and achieved outstanding evaluation results. Passionate Cambodian teachers and translators were also really motivated, showing flexibility and commitment to the program.

After every program we have received requests for more programs in September, October or July, the local holidays in Siem Reap, with the January time frame fine for Kampong Speu. The extent of the funding and the availability of the Team makes this challenging. The participants ask that workshops are provided twice a year to maintain motivation, consistency, engagement and momentum.

Initial contact with Local Government Education organisations and teacher training institutions has been made and it is exciting to note that both, in Siem Reap and Kampong Speu, there is much enthusiasm to include the Vocational Training Team program within the training for local teachers.

The Vice Director of the Training Capacities for Elementary Teachers in the Kampong Speu Province is happy to allow approximately 110 Year 2 students to participate in our program. Whereas in Siem Reap should teachers be willing to give up their holidays for extra professional development, the local Training Institute will provide rooms for training.

This is a really important development as the main challenge in delivering our program is the lack of certainty related to number of actual teachers attending until the first day of each program and then the actual numbers for each Stage of the program.

So this Vocational Training Team initiative is really making a difference and I believe is an inspiration to all who are able to be part of the program.



Let me conclude with some powerful testimonials:

I myself also used some activities from that training to apply in my classes like "Bingo with numbers" and "guessing what is in my mind" by asking questions: Thank you Louise for the good class!!! What I saw you have done which I thought it was great is: you will change from doing the training with the State School teachers but with the trainee teachers which I thought it will be more important for them and also useful for those teachers who really need the new things and experiences before starting to teach in the school. I love this idea so much!! Last but not least, on behalf of Cambodian and working as a teacher too I really need more people like you to come and help us more and we hope that you will still find the way to come and hope that you also can learn something new from us.



Working Bee transforms Talbot grounds

Twenty-two members and partners of Rotary Central Melbourne made a big difference to Royal Talbot Rehabilitation Centre's outdoor areas on Saturday April 14. Royal Talbot is a campus of Austin Health. Unkempt, unloved courtyard gardens were transformed during the morning. We put in about 60 person-hours of labor, creating neat and eye-soothing vistas of paths, garden-beds and grounds.

It was the 14th year in a row that our club has pounced on the grounds to create new gardens in place of dreary lawns and concrete, and to give existing gardens a thorough spruce-up.

The weather threatened but downpours held off until the job was done. As early as 8.30am the grounds were thronged with our members wielding barrows, picks and hoes. Members unfit for heavy labor provided soups and sponge treats.



Compared with previous years The 22 people were a great turnout. In earlier years Normally the numbers have been swelled with helpers and visitors from Melbourne Park and Melbourne Rotary clubs (one year we had a total 26 with a dozen from elsewhere).

During the working bee, one raised garden bed was readied for vegetable-growing that has been planned by staff and patients for the units' kitchens. Austin's coordinator Steven Wells said it was a passion of spinal unit staffer Anton to create a "plant to plate" opportunity with a "period of dreaming" from planting to harvest and cooking sessions. There would now be plenty of space for pumpkins to run, for example.



Other areas worked on would be filled with strong tough plants involving low maintenance, and sensory plants like curry, coriander and herbs, he said.

"Thank you, it's been fantastic to have your time and labor," Steven said. "We really appreciate and value it."

Banking Breast Milk in the Philippines

Proposal for a Breast Milk Bank facility at the Amang Rodriguez Medical Centre, Markina Government Hospital in the Philippines

An initiative of the Rotary Club of Markina East, Philippines and the Rotary Club of Hoppers Crossing, Victoria

Is your club interested in supporting a very worthwhile project which will greatly assist malnourished infants in Markina, Philippines? Then consider supporting a project organised by the Rotary Club of Hoppers Crossing which is aimed at funding a Human Breast Milk Bank facility in partnership with the Rotary Club of Markina East. This Human Breast Milk Bank project will be located at the Amang Rodriguez Medical Centre, Markina Government Hospital and has an objective of providing milk from a Human Milk bank to sick undernourished infants admitted to the neonatal intensive care unit in Markina.

The Markina East club, who are the leading club for this initiative, have indicated that they are intending to apply for a global grant to support this project which requires a contribution from a district outside the Philippines. This global grant joint proposal requires a US\$15,000 contribution from the Hoppers Crossing Rotary and other clubs in district 9800 and contributions of US\$15,000 from districts 3800 and 3780 in the Philippines. If these contributions are met this proposal will be eligible for a US \$45,000 global grant. The Rotary Club of Markina East in the Philippines will be the lead agency for this proposal which is aimed at establishing a Breast Milk Bank program at the Amang Rodriguez Medical Centre which is located at the Markina Government Hospital. The total cost of this project is US \$90,000. The Rotary Club of Hoppers Crossing is the lead club for this initiative for district 9800. It is proposed that the contribution from local clubs of \$13,300 would be supported by a 2:1 district grant of \$6,700.

Background information on establishing a Human Breast Milk Bank project has been obtained from Dr Gillian Opie, the manager of a Breast Milk Bank facility at the Mercy Hospital for Women in Heidelberg. Representatives from the Rotary Club of Hoppers Crossing visited the facility at the Mercy Hospital and were provided with detailed information on the establishment and management of the human milk bank project.

Dr Opie indicated that detailed procedures were needed to identify each sample, to store the milk samples and to identify and deactivate any pathogens. She also described the need to provide back up plans for power black outs so that the samples were kept frozen at all times. The selection of donor babies was provided by Neonatal Care Units who specialised in the care and support for new born babies.



The breast milk bank facilities in the Philippines will be constructed by a Malaysian company which has had extensive experience in building and equipping human milk bank facilities in a number of countries. A number of queries have been raised with Tess Bernardin from the Markina Club in the Philippines. In response to a question on who would pay for the ongoing expenses it was indicated that once the facility was established the Milk Bank would be fully supported by the government since the Markina is a public hospital.

We also asked a question on how undernourished babies and donor mothers would be selected. We were subsequently advised that the Amang Rodrigues Medical

Centre selects babies that are undernourished and who have been referred from the Neonatal Intensive Care Unity. We were also informed that the Markina Hospital has a policy of accepting all donors for the Human Milk Bank facility and would install equipment that eliminates and deactivates viruses and bacteria pathogens.

In this application we are seeking contributions of A\$13,300 from district 9800 clubs and A\$6,700 for a district grant to support this project at the Amang Rodrigues Medical Centre, Markina General Hospital. This project is aimed at treating undernourished infants in Markina.

Each year, members of the Rotary Club of North Balwyn provide a catering service for officials at the Grand Prix. This year over 40 members, family and friends took part in a project which raised over \$30,000 for the club. Congratulations on a fantastic event and result.



Glenferrie provides Emergency Care Packs for the Homeless

Our project was to deliver 100 packs of 52 items for Emergency Care for the Homeless to Camcare and the Salvation Army in Camberwell. Both of these organisations do a wonderful job in distributing much needed items to the Homeless people of Boroondara city. We were staggered to learn that under the definition of “Homeless means no fixed address” that there were some 400 people in this category in our city.

- Many are in temporary public housing.
- Many are in temporary rooming houses
- Some are in precarious situations using couch surfing or sleeping in a car.
- About 10 people have no other option but to sleep on the street.

This is often the result of family violence, marriage breakdown or other personal problems. The items included: Basic personal necessities such as: toiletry items (eg toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, comb), clothing items (eg socks, underwear), towels, non-perishable food with long “best before” dates (eg muesli bars, pasta, soup, noodles, juices).

The following steps were taken by the 7 members our Community Service Committee:

- Meeting with Boroondara Council officers to determine the extent of the homeless problem
- Meetings with both care organisations to determine which items would be most beneficial.
- Visits to local retail stores for research on prices.
- Community Service Committee meetings to finalise our spreadsheet of items.
- Order and collect 100 of each of 52 items from 6 retail stores and DIK.
- Deliver items (not packed into emergency packs following requests from the two organisations as they prefer to hand out items on a needs basis) to Camcare and the Salvation Army in Camberwell.

Up to 400 Homeless people will benefit from our project. We were also delighted to receive a local Rotary Foundation Grant of \$2500 to match our contribution of \$2500. The expected long-term community impacts of the project are:

As well as giving vital short-term relief to the Homeless our aim was to gain publicity locally (Leader newspaper) to highlight the extent of the problem in our local area. A side benefit will be a possible increase in our Club membership that this publicity may bring.

Is the project sustainable?

Given the gratitude shown by the homeless recipients and the two care organisations our Club will look to repeat this project in future years.

How was the role of Rotary and the Rotary Foundation recognised?

Both organisations sent letters of appreciation to our Club.

We will gain publicity in our own Bulletin for our many community readers as well as aiming to have items published in our local Leader newspaper, our District Networker and our RDU magazine.

The opportunity that changed my life

Sometimes, all you need is a chance – that one opportunity of a lifetime. Rotary gave me that chance.

I grew up in the Democratic Republic of Congo, where human life has little value. Children are taken from their families and forced into the army, women are raped daily, and men are killed in front of their loved ones. Massacre is the norm. The only way to survive this brutal environment is to flee the country, and when I was nine, that's what my family and I did.

We moved to South Africa, a country that was foreign to us on so many levels. The language and the currency were different. We knew no one. Of the few people that showed us kindness, most were Rotarians. They came forward and helped us when we needed it most. At that time, I knew nothing about Rotary. In 2007, [Rotary Youth Exchange](#) students from Australia, France, Germany, and the U.S. came to my school for their year abroad and it was through them that I truly became interested in Rotary.

I learned about fellowship, the value of friendship, and what it means to serve. The more I learned of the work of the Rotary Club of Durban Berea, the more my interest grew. When I completed high school, Rotary International gave me the opportunity to be an exchange student in Duluth, Minnesota, USA.

My life changed in so many ways during my exchange. I grew as a leader by surrounding myself with Rotarians who were leaders of action in their professional field and their community. I contributed to hands-on projects that made immediate impact in the community. When I met other youth exchange students, I was exposed to new cultures, traditions, and languages. My experience built my self-confidence, allowed me to be more globally competent, and it gave me an opportunity to make lifelong friends.

When I returned to Durban, South Africa, after my exchange, I joined the [Rotaract Club of Durban Berea](#) to be with people my age who knew the value of serving others. This allowed me to further develop my leadership skills, to network, and to continue having fun with like-minded people.

I was accepted at the University of Minnesota-Duluth, allowing me to return to the U.S. in 2013. I built upon the relationships that I had developed during my exchange year with host families and Rotarians to found the [Twin Ports Rotaract Club in Duluth](#). I started this club because I felt empowered by Rotarians from Durban and Duluth. My goal was to form a group of vibrant and dynamic individuals who enjoy serving their community, a group that does not discriminate based on gender, race, or nationality.

Twin Ports Rotaract has done several service projects in Minnesota, South Africa, and recently in Guatemalan communities. When I look back, I can see how my life has been completely transformed by the generosity of the people I met through the Rotary Youth Exchange program. Today, I am more passionate about empowering others and making a significant impact in the lives of the people I meet because of the Rotarians who took the time and believed in me.




