Making a Real Difference

Rotary International President John Kenny has asked us this Rotary Year, as one of his emphases' for the year 2009-10, to focus on Water and Sanitation. I also spoke at each club, during my official visits, on the importance of clean water and basic sanitation. You may remember the words of Kofi Annan when he said "Access to safe water is a basic human right". Despite this right 1.2 billion people lack access to safe water and 2.6 billion lack access to basic sanitation.

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This year we in District 9800 are "Making a Real Difference in Water and Sanitation" projects with our commitment to two programs in the Philippines. Through our District Rotary Foundation Designated Fund we have recently provided a significant contribution to the Rotary International and U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) Alliance Project based at Zamboanga, Mindanao Province, Philippines.

Additionally, we have provided through cash contributions from our clubs toward a Multi District Matching Grant # 71234 with our partners in D5500 and 9520 South Australia,,D9810 and D9800 in Victoria, and D3838 Philippines for a Waste Water Treatment Project - Barangay 6, at Guiuan Municipality, East Samar Province, Philippines. I sincerely thank all those clubs who provided funds for my "DG Call's for Support" initiative, it was greatly appreciated.

While both of these projects are designed to improve Water and Sanitation facilities in impoverished Philippine communities, they are being implemented, managed and funded in very different ways. By way of explanation, the RI/USAID Alliance is a totally new Rotary International initiative. It sits together with our Future Vision of The Rotary Foundation. The Matching Grant project # 71234 is part of our existing Foundation program. Let me provide some background to both these very important projects:

DISTRICT 9800 SUPPORTS NEW FUTURE VISION PHILIPPINE HUMANITARIAN PROJECT

Through the District 9800 Rotary Foundation "District Designated Funds" we have provided financial support to a new Rotary International Humanitarian Project in the Philippines. In this project we have joined together with other rotary clubs and districts on a world wide basis to participate in a new Alliance forged between Rotary International and the U.S. Agency for International Development.

The U.S. Agency for International Development is the U.S. government agency that provides economic, development and humanitarian assistance around the world in support of the foreign policy goals of the United States. Part of the goals cover assistance in promoting health, agriculture, education and humanitarian needs. These goals being entirely compatible with the objectives of the Rotary Foundation.

This Alliance is the result of discussions that were initiated between Rotary International and the USAID Agency in 2004 to explore opportunities for a potential strategic partnership in those areas of mutual interest. Discussions continued through to 2008 when agreement was reached and a formal Steering Committee was formed being made up of both senior Rotarians and USAID Officials. This Steering Committee is chaired by PRIP Bill Boyd. Our guest speaker at the Perth District Conference, PDG Ron Denham, Chair of Rotary International Water and Sanitation Group, is also a member of this committee. PDG Terry Barritt who currently heads up the Water Resource Group, South Pacific Region is the Primary International Contact for the Philippine Project.


The Alliance has agreed on implementing three projects in differing developing countries. The three countries being the Dominican Republic, Ghana and the Philippines. These countries were selected on several strategic factors, including need, and the proven experience by Rotarians and USAID missions in these countries.

The Philippine Alliance consists of five separate water and sanitation management projects. The whole five projects being considered will be managed as a single project. Funding is being provided on a 50/50 basis between RI and USAID. The five projects being all based on improving water management and supply systems to the Philippine communities of Davao, Dipolog, Pasig River, San Fernando and Zamboanga. The US\$15,000 provided by D9800 through our DDF has been allocated to the Zamboanga City Water District Water Supply Expansion Program 3H-Grant # 71465 which has a budgeted expenditure of US\$214,000. Zamboanga City is located in the southern Philippine Province of Mindanao.

WASTE WATER TREATMENT SYSTEM - MATCHING GRANT #71234

This RI/USAID Alliance is not the only Project that our District is currently supporting in the Philippines. We are also providing funds contributed from our clubs totalling US\$19,920 for a Decentralised Wastewater Treatment System in the Municipality of Guiuan, East Samar Province, Philippines. The purpose of this Waste Water Treatment System is intended to reduce the incidence of Gastro Intestinal Disease amongst the Guiuan community. In this waste water treatment system we are joining in partnership with our neighbour District 9810, Districts 9550 and 9520 in South Australia and the host District 3830 in the Philippines. Through the involvement and consultancy of the Coffey International Development Company based in Adelaide we are also partnering with the World Bank who is providing 30% of the budgeted funding for the project totalling US\$152,000.

The Guiuan Council has examined various types of systems, and decided after exhaustive evaluation and discussion with Coffey International Development Pty Ltd, that a Decentralised Wastewater Treatment System (DEWATS) low cost plant will meet their needs.



(DEWATS) Decentralised Wastewater Treatment System

The DEWATS system will cost 6 million Philippines pesos or US\$152,555 and will be completed within 6 months of commencement using local labour and materials. We hope that in due course a significant improvement in the health and well being will be gained by the impoverished people of the Guiuan community.

This District is extremely pleased to be able to participate in these very worthwhile projects and I would like to thank all those involved including PDG Ron Denham, Chair of Rotary International Water and Sanitation Group; PDG Terry Barritt, Water Resource Group, Area Coordinator, South Pacific Region; Peter Rostron Zone 7 Coordinator Water Resource; D9800 Foundation Chair Chris Don his team and of course our club members.

You have all Made a Real Difference in improving Water and Sanitation in our region. Thank You

15th Anniversary of Cairo Conference

This is an excerpt of remarks by Hillary Clinton, US Secretary of State, on the 15th Anniversary of the Cairo Conference on Population and Development. Washington, DC. January 8, 2010

...... However, vast inequities remain. Too often, still today in 2010, women and girls bear the burdens of regional and global crises, whether it's an economic downturn or climate change or political instability. They still are the majority of the world's poor, unschooled, unhealthy, and underfed. They are rarely the cause of violent consequences, but increasingly – of violent conflicts, but increasingly they bear the consequences of such conflicts. We've seen that from the Congo to Bosnia to Burma. And 15 years after the Cairo conference, far too many women still have little or no access to reproductive health services, including family planning and maternal healthcare.

When we look at this deficit in healthcare for women, we can see what it means in terms of lost productivity, lost resources, and lost lives. Nearly half the women in the developing world deliver their babies without a nurse, a midwife, a doctor, or access to crucial medical care. Global rates of maternal mortality remain perilously high; one woman dies every minute of every day in pregnancy or childbirth, and for every woman who dies, another 20 suffer from injury, infection, or disease every minute.



More than 215 million women worldwide lack access to the modern forms of contraception, and this contributes to the nearly 20 million unsafe abortions that take place very year. Sexually transmitted diseases, of course including, but not limited to, HIV and AIDS, claim millions of lives annually among women. Fistula destroys the lives of millions, and it is often the result of pregnancies that occur when a girl is too young. An estimated 70 million – that is 70 million women and girls worldwide – have been subjected to female genital cutting, a procedure that is not only painful and traumatic but is also the source of infections and increased risks of injury during childbirth.

Now, as we know very well, the topic of reproductive health is subject to a great deal of debate. But I think we should all agree that these numbers are not only grim, but after 15 years, they are intolerable. For if we believe that human rights are women's rights and women's rights are human rights, then we cannot accept the ongoing marginalization of half the world's population. We cannot accept it morally, politically, socially, or economically. (Applause)

Australian Rotary Health

Australian Rotary Health is Australia's largest non-government funding body of mental illness research. It also funds research in other health related areas.

The genesis of Australian Rotary Health in 1981 was the mystery of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS). The Late Ian Scott, from the Rotary Club of Mornington, established Australian Rotary Health to support research into SIDS. As Australian Rotary Health grew so did the vision of medical research possibilities. Supported by Rotarians Australian wide, Australian Rotary Health was soon in a position to sponsor health research in areas that did not readily attract funding.



Australian Rotary Health has a broad vision of health. It is a catalyst for projects that improve the quality of life for people who are least able to assist themselves.

Over 300 research projects have been funded with more than 150 of these in mental illness. Remember: Today's research is tomorrow's treatment.

- 80 PhD research scholars are being funded by ARH or have recently graduated.
- 70 indigenous health scholars are funded by ARH each year.
- More than 50 ARH sponsored doctors and nurses have worked in rural hospitals and communities.
- Over 500 Community Mental Health Forums have taken place with an estimated 50,000 Australians attending to learn about mental health issues.





May is Rotary Health Research Month

Supporting Healthier Minds, Bodies and Communities

Rotary International is at the forefront in supporting programs to improve the health of people throughout the world. In Australia, the Rotary Health Research Fund is one of the largest independent health research funds. Australian Rotary Health (ARH) has been approved by the Board of Rotary International as a multidistrict project and is registered under Corporation Law.

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Australia Rotary Health's primary mission

is to fund medical research by Australians, for Australians. Those research projects that are eligible for funding are selected by an honorary Research Committee, comprising eminent medical professionals from around Australia. ARH has now allocated over \$20 million in grants to Australian researchers with the major focus of this research currently on Mental Illness but other areas supported have included:

- Cancer research (bowel, prostate, breast and pancreatic)
- Multiple Sclerosis
- Motor Neurone disease: organ transplants: leukaemia and many others.

This year ARH endowed 10 pilot research studies under the new initiative *Mental Health of Young Australians* (*Birth to 17 Years*). The project is the first of its kind in Australia with over \$300,000 being spent on funding the pilot research projects. This research is a valuable investment in the health of Australian children.

How It All Began

Australian Rotary Health began with one objective to provide funds for research into Cot Death. After the initial funds were provided for Cot Death research, the additional spending was directed towards other areas of health which impact significantly on the community. By having research projects that contain a strong element of applied research, it is possible to bring about practical strategies to enhance community health in a way that allows individual Rotarians and Rotary Clubs to see the benefits applied in their own communities.

Programs of Australian Rotary Health

Mental Illness Research Projects - Grants

Provides research grants for up to 3 years per project

Mental Illness Research PhD - Scholarships

Provide financial support to PhD students

Mental Illness Post Doctoral - Fellowships

Will be provided to early career researchers in the area on mental illness.

Evaluation of Mental Health Services- Research Project Grants

This funding aims to improve local mental health services by providing grants to evaluate current programs.

Evaluation of Rural Health Services - Research Grants

Funding will support research projects that have the potential to restore or promote the health of Australians living in rural and / or remote areas.

Indigenous Health Scholarships.

This program assists Indigenous Australians who are undertaking a health related university course.

Scholarships for Nursing

Rural Nursing Scholarships provide an incentive for nursing students to complete their third year major clinical placement and graduating year in a rural or remote area.

Funding Partners - Research in all Health Areas - PhD Scholarships

ARH Funding Partners program helps to provide funds for medical research in areas other than mental illness. If a Rotary club wants to provide a grant for a particular area of research for instance heart disease, ARH will also contribute and arrange contributions from the scholar's university.

How Can You Participate In This Research?

Rotary Clubs are invited to form a partnership with Australian Rotary Health (ARH) to jointly fund a research project grant or a research scholarship in an area of health that is not the current focus for the fund. For instance, a Rotary Club or Cluster can join a University and ARH to jointly fund a PhD Scholarship. Also Clubs and individuals can make a contribution to ARH by becoming a "Friend" or "Companion" of the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund (ARHRF). Donations over \$2 are tax deductible.



You may not have heard of **Kevin Jia-Jin Loo** yet. However, if his academic record is anything to go by this brilliant young Australian could well become a researcher of renown.

Born in 1989 in Bathurst, NSW, to Malaysian-Chinese parents Kevin moved to Wollongong to start kindergarten in 1995. His father worked at the University of Wollongong as senior lecturer in the Graduate School of Journalism, so Kevin was exposed to the University environment and academic life from an early age.

Kevin was admitted into an accelerated learning program in infants and primary school. In 1999 he was accelerated from Year 3 to Year 5. The 10 year old was then accelerated to Year 7 in 2000 after achieving equal first in a state-wide 'Gifted Education Research Resource and Information Centre' test.



At 16 Kevin completed high school. His keen interest in science and mathematics led to his acceptance into the advanced honours program in Medical and Radiation Physics at the University of Wollongong. He completed his honours thesis with high distinction in 2009. This year, aged 20, he commenced his PhD as an Australian Rotary Health/District 9690 Funding Partner Scholar.

Kevin's PhD studies will focus on improved brachytherapy treatment for prostate cancer, one of the most commonly diagnosed cancers in men over 55.

On a beautiful Australia Day, the Rotary Club of Brighton held the inaugural AUSTRALIAN UNITY GREAT AUSTRALIA DAY SWIM. About 100 Rotarian and partner volunteers brought months of planning to spectacular fruition.

With the assistance of professional event management, 485 swimmers took part in 16 age and gender group events starting deep water from Brighton pier and swimming around the marina finishing on the beach in front of the Royal Brighton Yacht Club.

This was followed by a corporate teams relay race of 5 by 200 metres with several past and present Olympic swimmers competing including Brightonian John Konrads.

Marketing Tip: Great Speeches

A great speech does not just inspire or capture the truth: it allows us to get our wonderful message across

Since 1905 Rotary has encouraged members to become inspirational leaders and allowed them to practice the power of speech at meetings, community events and in the media.

Not all of us are born great orators and indeed a number of worthy Rotarians have had years of practice in order to develop into charismatic public speakers.



Through David Moss Bennett's course on 23rd May, you too could become proficient in the art of public speaking. See under "News and Events" below.

Here are some tips to ensure that you get a strong message to your audience:

DO . . .

- Ensure you have done your homework and researched your topic thoroughly.
- Speak clearly, and adjust your voice so that everyone can hear you.
- Be passionate and well intentioned—this way the subject of your speech will sell itself.
- Use language that your audience understands.
- Effectively use pauses in your speech. Pauses can help to emphasise a point, or to allow the audience to react to a fact, anecdote or joke.
- Make eye contact with your audience. This helps to build trust and a relationship between you and the listeners
- Be yourself, allow your own personality to shine in your speech.

DON'T..

- Talk in a monotone. Intonation is important. A monotone voice loses the audience's attention.
- Be political.
- Talk about yourself.
- Speak too fast. It is common to speak rapidly when nervous, try to take your time speaking
- Talk for too long. Ensure that you stick to the time period allocated to you.


An International Experience

Victorian Bushfire Recovery

Marysville:

The RI D9800 Bushfire Recovery Fund has made a major financial contribution to the redevelopment of one of the very few buildings in Marysville that survived the fire unscathed, the old Motor Museum. The Project was considered by independent consultants (Boston Consulting Group) to be essential to the recovery of Marysville and neighbouring townships: the surviving resident community supported that view.

The premises were purchased by the Victorian Government, rather belatedly, and the Commonwealth Government and Rotary contributed to the conversion of the building into a shopping and business complex.



This was a Rotary Multi-district Project involving donation of funds by Districts 9790, 9800, 9810, and 9830 amounting to \$370,000, of which D9800 contributed \$165,000. Significant proportions of the D9800 contribution came from donations made to the RI D9800 Bushfire Recovery Fund by Rotary International of Britain and Ireland and the Rotary Club of Brighton, both of these bodies having expressly specified that they wished their donations to be expended in Marysville.

Marysville Central is now recognised as being a major contributor to improvement of confidence within the community; it has also provided job opportunities for residents, and essential services for residents and tourists / visitors. Rotary involvement in this Project enabled the establishment of a formal understanding between all parties concerned that the Shire of Murrindindi will retain control of Marysville Central into the future on behalf of the Marysville Community: the Community is in effect the beneficial owner.

Kinglake:

A second major project is now being developed; again it will involve multi-district funding. The provision of a Youth Space at Kinglake is considered to be essential for reasons previously explained. The Rotary contribution is likely to be of the order of \$400,000. Non-Rotary donors have also indicated their willingness to contribute to the project in both cash and kind. It is hoped that physical implementation of the Project will commence before the end of June 2010.

WHERE DO WE GO FROM NOW?

Much work remains to be done to assist the fire affected communities. Consolidation of current projects and development of new projects will certainly continue over the next year. Even after all available funds are committed there will be need for follow up. Equipment owned by the RI D9800 Bushfire Recovery Fund will have to be sold, funds realised will be placed back in the Recovery Fund and applied to projects.

There is still great need for *personal involvement of volunteers* in the fire affected communities. There is no standard prescription for such involvement, it can take many forms. Volunteers need to identify for themselves how they might assist. Good starting contact points are organizations such as Global Care, Community Recovery Committees, and local schools in fire affected areas. Based on the known current position, it is estimated that conclusion of the work of the RI D9800 Bushfire Recovery Committee will not occur until at least June 2012.

Operation of the Rotary Bushfire Recovery Program has been and remains very demanding; however, there is great satisfaction to be obtained from the success of the work involved. All Rotarians in D9800 are urged to continue to remember that the end of the road to recovery is far from being in sight, much remains to be done and any help that can be provided is still needed and will be appreciated.







Kokoda – Connecting the Community

The Kokoda Project is a Victoria Police programme taking young people from the high rise of Flemington to the hills of Kokoda.

It has been supported by the Rotary Club of Williamstown, since a member of the club saw a need to engage Rotary and Victoria Police in raising funds for troubled Youths to participate in this project. These kids, both male and female are identified as having low self esteem and are disenfranchised in the community, lacking goals and direction in life and are at risk of not completing school. They are taken on a positive life changing experience walking the Kokoda track.

The Spirit of Kokoda changes the lives of all who take the challenge.

- Aims To Provide a positive and life changing experience, normally not available to young people in this community.

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
Rotary Praises Polio Efforts

In recognition of their ongoing support of a polio-free world, four members of the U.S. Congress and one government official received Rotary's *Polio Eradication Champion* Award on 5 May in Washington, D.C.

Since the mid-1980s, the U.S. government has contributed \$1.7 billion to the cause. President Barack Obama also announced a global push for polio eradication in conjunction with the Organization of the Islamic Conference during a 2009 speech in Cairo. The location was chosen for its symbolism: Ancient Egyptian artwork features the earliest known depictions of people disabled by the disease.

In addition to the 2010 honorees, Past RI President James Lacy acknowledged the ongoing leadership of the more than 40 other members of Congress whom Rotary has previously recognized.



"The progress made toward polio eradication is seen through the collective achievement of the current and past congressional recipients of the Polio Eradication Champion Award," said Lacy. "When Congress began its support of this effort, nearly 60 countries had polio. Today there are only four countries. We must maintain this level of dedication to end polio forever."

RI President Elect Ray Klinginsmith honored volunteers of the *Stop Transmission of Polio* program who have been killed during eradication efforts in hostile regions, calling them "heroes."

Global leaders who have received the Polio Eradication Champion Award include President Laurent Gbagbo of Côte d'Ivoire, former President Mamadou Tandja of Niger, Chancellor Angela Merkel of Germany, Prime Minister Manmohan Singh of India, and United Nations Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon.

Changing Audience Perspectives

Within Rotary, we see words like "Foundation" or "Service" and know exactly what they mean. We see the Rotary International emblem and we know what it represents. We know when we speak to a fellow Rotarian that they hold admirable values.



But as Clubs how often do we consider how we are seen by those outside of Rotary? Are we aware of the perceptions and misconceptions others hold? Do we understand how these impact on us? Are we doing anything to counter misconceptions?

Before trying to gain publicity, we should first gain an understanding of just how we are perceived publicly:

How we are currently seen by the public

How we want to be seen by the public

What we need to accentuate in order to reduce the difference between the actual and desired perceptions. Who we particularly want to take notice of us (Our Target Audience)

Each Club needs a plan to combat the misconceptions that can arise about Rotary and Rotarians – we can't put our head in the sand or just remain adamant that the misconceptions aren't true so they don't affect us. Often we won't get a chance to tell people in person where the truth really lies, so we need actions, events, promotions, advertising, and myth busting examples to break down "mythconceptions".

What actions and promotion does your Club take to break down the following common perceptions and misconceptions?

Rotary is all about sausage sizzles

Rotary doesn't achieve much or do anything worthwhile

I'd be just one person if I joined – I couldn't initiate new projects

Joining Rotary would mean sacrificing time spent on my passions

All those terms like "Foundation" and RYLA/RYPEN, ARHRF are all Rotary-speak

Rotarians are all men

Rotarians are all old people

Rotary is a secret society only for people invited into it

I went to a Rotary meeting once but it was stuffy and boring

Rotary is just a local organisation that only does local projects

There's nobody from my background in Rotary and they don't welcome people like me



What we do – in terms of projects, publicity and the examples we provide - will determine how we are seen by the public. So if you always do what you've always done means you'll always gets what you have always got, what do you need to start doing?

COUNCIL ON LEGISLATION REPORT

It was my privilege to represent D9800 as a voting delegate at the recant Council On Legislation..

Together with Board Directors and Foundation Trustees, 528 voting delegates, one from each Rotary District, attended the Council.

The Council provides Rotary with a opportunity to make significant and thoughtful changes to our constitutional documents, to present important resolutions for consideration by the RI Board and to suggest legislation for future Councils..

Significant decisions were to approve a fifth Avenue of Service, New Generations and to rarify the formation of e- Clubs.with the limit of 2 clubs per District.

There were 24 resolutions proposed concerning The Rotary Foundation dealing with the inclusion of new programs, such as environmental conservation, hearing care, blindness, TB, mental illness and Infant mortality. all worthy in their right but all were defeated in view of the Future Vision program. Most were then referred to the Board.

Rotary maintained its integrity in defeating several resolutions to include spouses.partners,children and grandchildren of Rotarians as eligible for the various Foundation awards and programs. Also defeated ware proposals for the Trustees to consider accepting grants applications ONLY from clubs that contribute to the Annual Program Fund and that Matching Grants be provided for construction and associated volunteer service.
