## March Is World Literacy Month

## Rotary: Bringing Literacy to the World

In today's world, one in five adults is still not literate (two thirds of them women) while 72 million children do not attend school.

#### Why is Literacy important?

Literacy is a right, a tool of personal empowerment and a key element in social development. Educational opportunities are absolutely dependent on literacy. Literacy heightens communication and, as such, is essential in the struggle to eradicate poverty, reduce child mortality, curb population growth, achieve gender equality and to work towards ensuring sustainable development, peace and democracy.

Literacy is at the core of everyone's education. A quality basic education equips pupils with *literacy skills for life* and encourages further learning. Literate parents are more likely to send their children to school. Literate people have better access to continuing educational opportunities, and literate societies are better placed to address change and development.

Rotary clubs in our District have made major contributions to improving the levels of literary in our own local communities. **Remember, illiteracy is not restricted to underdeveloped countries**. In our own District there are specific areas where literacy levels are well below the State and National average. Programs such as **BookStart** and **Read to Me** are two programs in our District initiated and implemented by Rotary Clubs that are addressing these concerns.

In 1978, Rotary International President Clem Renouf, an Australian, launched Rotary's Health, Hunger and Humanity program (more commonly known as the 3H program). A decade later another Rotary International President, Glen Kinross also an Australian (and attending our Shepparton Conference) declared that Rotarians could and ought to do something significant about the widespread hunger, need and misery that existed in developing countries.

As one of his two major initiatives, he set up a **Literacy and Numeracy Task Force**, charged with enabling Rotary to play a significant part in alleviating mass illiteracy in developing counties. This Task Force put its considerable weight behind an effective pilot literacy project - **Concentrated Language Encounter (CLE)** - which targeted areas of greatest need. The basic methodology of CLE teaching was developed in Australia during the 1970's by Dr Brian Gray for use in settings where conventional literacy programs were utterly failing. It was intended that the CLE projects that would be sustained and magnified in the years ahead were to be known as the **Lighthouse Strategy**.

Six major Rotary (3H) literacy projects have been generated through the Lighthouse Literacy strategies. The first one, in Thailand, was in schools. The next were in Bangladesh and the Solomon Islands. These were followed by initiatives in South Africa, Turkey and Brazil.

The Bangladesh project has particular relevance to our District. The late PDG Jack Nankervis sparked interest when he was a guest speaker at the Rotary Club of Footscray when he spoke of the success of the CLE teaching program in Thailand and told the club of the need for such a program in Bangladesh, where the exiting levels of literacy rated at no better than 15%. The club responded to this plea by allocating an amount of \$6,000 to develop a pilot program in Bangladesh. It began in 3 schools and initially involved 240 children. By 2002 it had reached 500 schools and 368,000 children.

At the Rotary Conference in Canberra in 1996, Jack Nankervis approached the Rotary Club of Footscray with the suggestion that the club make application to the Rotary Foundation for a US\$500,000 Foundation Grant which would enable a literacy program to be developed to cover all of Bangladesh.


In October 1997, the Foundation met to approve 8 projects from 31 world wide. Our submission was successful and it is still one of the largest major grants ever obtained by our District. The Rotary Clubs of Balwyn, Bendigo and Bendigo Sandhurst were also a vital part of the part of project, for without their financial support the project may have not reached fruition.

This is an example of how **ONE IDEA**, properly nurtured by dedicated Rotarians and supported financially by our Rotary Foundation, has reached out and changed the lives of a people for generations to come.

It is my fervent hope that in future years we will see Rotary and other international organizations cooperatively accelerating progress towards the elimination of mass illiteracy in the developing world.

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## **Victorian Research Tops Funding**

Ten Victorian researchers have been successful in gaining funding for mental health and rural health projects beginning in 2008 from the ARHRF. This is the most of any State.

The following is a list of the new ARHRF Ian Scott Scholars from Victoria.

Ian Scott scholarships are three-year PhD scholarships awarded for research in the area of mental health. They are named after the founder of the ARHRF.

## **Rotary World Peace Fellowships**

### **Rotary Peace & Conflict Studies Professional Development**

Rotary offers TWO outstanding programs in peace and conflict resolution but we are not attracting enough strong applicants. We are asking for your, and your Club's, assistance in support of these Foundation programs.

The Rotary World Peace Fellowship (RWPF) is for study for a Masters degree at a Rotary Center for International Studies at one of 6 prestigious universities around the world. It is generously funded- up to \$US62,000- for up to 18 months.

The Rotary Peace and Conflict Studies Program (RPCSP) is a 3 month Certificate course at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok for mid career professionals with a regional focus which is highly relevant to Australia and its aid programs in the Asia-Pacific

You may be unaware of the RPCSP –Bangkok –which has received less publicity. The Rotary Club of Canterbury successfully nominated our District's first participant -Susan Carew - who is there now. Susan is the first Australian to be nominated.

D9800 is a world leader in successfully nominating candidates for RWPF. Initially identifying candidates requires creative persistency. Being new programs, they are not widely known. Being specialized programs and with candidates possibly working in conflict prone countries, advertising is pointless. Rotarians are not in touch with potential candidates. But we do have contacts with their employers: NGOs, Aid agencies, government, police and military peace keepers. We need your Clubs' help in getting the message to these organizations. Writing is a soft option. Getting the name of a well placed executive, speaking with him/her, following up with concise material and by phone is far more effective. Sure, it is hard work, but it is so rewarding and at the core of Rotary's mission. This is how we have placed D9800 as one of the top 3 Districts in the world! Some Districts find it just too hard and give up.

We ask you to nominate a member of your Club to take responsibility for searching for candidates. It is a Foundation Program so that is where you may wish to start. Please tell us who that person is so we can support their efforts and provide follow up information.

Our successful experience arises from mentoring of candidates as they prepare their application. It is very rewarding and the District has several enthusiastic and committee Committee members who can be contacted for further information. They would be delighted to hear from your Club.









Both programs lack sufficient high calibre candidates. You and your Club can play a pivotal role in these great programs which are already making a difference to our world.

## **Our Ambassadorial Scholar Reports In**

The following letter from our Districts 2006 Ambassadorial Scholar Holly Bannon-Murphy is testament to this magnificent program which is financially supported by our Districts Rotarians through their Clubs Annual Giving and Centurion Sustaining Members Fund to The Foundation of Rotary International. As Rotarians we can all be justifiably proud in our active participation of this Foundation Educational Program.

To Rotarians Chris Don, Michael Elligate, David Gorman and Ted Levecke,

Thank you very much for your emails and I am sorry that I haven't replied until now. As you heard, I was quite ill for a number of weeks but I am better now. I had malaria in early February when I was travelling around Ghana. I was treated immediately in Kumasi (the second largest city in Ghana) but unfortunately some remnants of the parasite were still in my bloodstream so I had a relapse a week later which then gave me pneumonia. I was admitted to a hospital in Accra for almost a week, and I have now fully recovered. The doctors and nurses were very attentive and the care that I received was wonderful.

It was quite an adventure!

Aside from that, I have been keeping quite busy. My Rotary Host Counselor Mr. Felix Nyarko-Pong was offered a fantastic job opportunity in Amsterdam so he has now left Ghana. I spent Christmas with him and his family, which was a lovely cultural experience, with a blend of traditional Christmas dishes and Ghanaian foods. I have now been assigned a new host counselor and look forward to a new experience with a different family.

I have also been heavily involved in Rotary in Ghana, attending the meetings of a number of clubs including the Roteract Club at the University of Ghana, my host club Accra North and Accra Airport. Last semester a number of the Ambassadorial scholars and I attended a movie fundraiser run by the Accra Airport Rotary club, the proceeds of which have gone to drilling boreholes and digging wells to provide water for rural communities in Ghana.

I am also volunteering - last semester I was involved with the Legon Hospital, using my skills from my Psychology major to help out with recovering patients. In December I met the head of the Pantang Psychiatric Hospital at a Rotary meeting and she requested my help with the reopening and general functioning of the Occupational Therapy Department at her hospital so I was referred on. I am now working two days each week with individuals with mental illnesses and disabilities at Pantang Hospital, mostly in the Art therapy department and boosting literacy. It has been a very rewarding experience so far, and I look forward to continuing work with the hospital this coming semester.

University has also been an interesting experience. I have been studying African politics, which was one of the aims when applying for the Ambassadorial scholarship. Learning about conflicts in an African context (such as the subject 'Conflicts in African states') has been incredibly eye-opening for me and has increased my understanding of the importance of cultural influences on peace and conflict resolution in sub-Saharan Africa. I have also been taking Arabic, which has been a challenge as the majority of the people in my 6-person class are native speakers. It has been so helpful for my language skills. My favourite Arabic subject last semester was Modern Arabic short stories, where we read stories in Arabic then analyzed them from an African, and specifically Ghanaian, viewpoint. I feel like I have more of an understanding of Middle eastern and sub-Saharan African culture.

Thank you all for your support prior to and during my Scholarship period. This is has been such a rich experience that I will never forget. I look forward to the adventures and experiences of the next 5 months.





## March Is World Literacy Month

## Words

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The power and beauty of spoken and written words is undeniable. Words have the potential to inform, inspire, encourage, explain, excite, change lives and circumstances and even have the ability to transport us to other worlds. Without words we have nothing...

The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) reports that there are currently 900 million people in the world who are illiterate through no fault of their own. This number represents approximately 25% of the world's population. Further statistics reveal that 72 million children are not able to attend a school and that a guarter of the world's population between the ages of sixteen and twenty-five, are functionally illiterate. These statistics are both shocking and damning.

#### What Does It Mean To Be Literate?

Literacy enables people to interpret the spoken and written words of others and an ability to express and communicate their own thoughts, ideas, needs and opinions. It is about being able to record language and decode the written word. It is about understanding, interpreting, analyzing, and responding to different forms of written, pictorial and spoken texts.

#### What Does It Mean To Be Illiterate?

Being illiterate, means being are forced to rely heavily on the spoken word as the main means of communication. It means being unable to read or write.

Life's opportunities become limited and the ability to work and live independently is constrained. Sadly, social activity and many normal interactions with other people are impaired and this, in turn, affects self-esteem and places restrictions on people ever being able to reach their full potential.

#### **Illiterate Australians**

Despite a world class education system illiteracy affects Australians, as well. A survey conducted in the Year 2000 found that about 45% of Australians have none or poor literacy skills.

These levels of illiteracy are even higher in Australia's indigenous and migrant populations. Although, on this point, it should be noted that their literacy levels are often based on English literacy testing and English is actually a second language for some or most of them.

In this environment, defeatist attitudes, unhappy and unsuccessful school experiences and feelings of inadequacy are rife. These feelings, combined with not understanding that learning can be a life-long journey, affects many illiterate adults. As they get older they 'turn away' and become less willing and more fearful of learning to read and write.

There are also survival instincts which come into play as the need to work and earn a living becomes a priority over learning. For illiterate people this presents further problems because they are forced into vocations that can put them risk in and are, characteristically, lower paying jobs.

#### How Can We Help Combat Illiteracy In Australia?

The key to improving literacy standards lies in the education of parents and of children at an early age. We have seen in recent years many Rotary clubs in our District promoting a wide range of activities for infants and young people. Ongoing programs such as Read to Me from the Rotary Club of Essendon North and BookStart, a joint program of the Rotary Club of Footscray, the Maribyrnong City Council via its Maternal Health Service and the Maribymong City Library have all made valuable contributions to raising literacy levels by encouraging parents to read to their children from an early age.

Another successful program that has been implemented in recent years by the Rotary Club of Daylesford is the Growing and Learning Together Program. The Literacy component, which was developed by PP Bronwen Scarffe who has spent 34 years in Australian educational institutions as a Primary Teacher, School leader, University Lecturer and Educational writer and consultant.

The Growing and Learning Together Program which has been implemented in the Daylesford area for four years and is presented as a package, including an explanatory letter, a pamphlet and a book, which is distributed to the families of all newborn children in the Shire.







The pamphlet encourages and explains how parents can play and spend quality time with their babies and toddlers – talking and listening to them, answering their questions, encouraging them to be curious and to explore their world. There are also sections on chanting, looking at the alphabet and print in different forms. Reading to them is central and enjoying books together, explaining and naming things, involving them in writing and drawing experiences, singing and dancing together all form part of the early social literacy experience.

Dare I say ... "In other words...." it first and foremost promotes the development of good oral language, an enjoyment and familiarity with written words, high self-esteem and an interest in learning. In so doing it introduces children to the early childhood skills and knowledge they all need to take with them to school so they are ready for expanded experiences and literacy.

It my belief that the **Growing and Learning Together Program** is a project that the seventy-one clubs in our District should consider implementing in their local area. If we could get behind a literacy program such as this, we could have a significant impact on literacy development and standards of the future.





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## **March Is World Literacy Month**

## The Year Of The Scout

There has been a another significant milestone birthday of a modern, dynamic worldwide movement

But it's not Rotary - our 103rd birthday was on 23 February. In D9800 we celebrated in front of the State Library.

The organization I am talking about is Scouts Australia which is celebrating 100 years of scouting in this country.

Many Rotarians first experienced the principle of Service above Self as young boys in what was known for many years as Bob-a-Job. In those days a Bob (for the chronologically challenged - a shilling .... OK, 10 cents) was reasonable payment for a job well done. Years involved in the Scout movement was where many of today's Rotarians became involved in the lives of people outside of their immediate family. For many of us, our first community deeds were done under the banner of what was the Boy Scouts Association.

I first join joined the Scout movement as a Cub Scout and progressed through the different sections before taking on a leadership role in a Rover crew. Eventually I became a District Scout Leader.

This pattern of community service at a young age is also reflected in the career path of DGE Jim Studebaker. He and I are but two examples from many, of how the "7 Up" series motto, "Give me the boy to 7 and I will give you the Man".

It illustrates how important the Scout movement and our own youth programs of MUNA, RYPEN. RYLA INTERACT and ROTARACT have been in our community. They have provided foundations for women and men willing to give SERVICE ABOVE SELF by joining Rotary as adults.

The founder of scouting, Lord Baden Powell, conducted an experimental camp in 1907 on Brownsea Island off the Dorset Coast of the U.K with 20 boys from all walks of life.

Lord Baden Powell was born in 1857, Paul Harris was born in 1868.

Rotary started in 1905 with 4 members, Scouting started in 1907 with 20 recruits.

One wonders whether these pioneers of two great and enduring organizations compared notes and drew inspiration from each other as each sought to realize their vision.

By 1908 scouting had commenced in Australia. This was only one year after its inception ... obviously, the lines of communication were good and our strong connection with the British Empire at that time may have been the reason.

Interestingly, it took Rotary 16 years to reach Australia and to commence its community involvement with the chartering of the Rotary Club of Melbourne in 1921.

Scouting is now the largest youth development organization in Australia and the world and it is an acknowledged leader in this country's non-formal education sector.

The scouting program delivered by Scouts Australia prepares young people aged 6-26 for business and community leadership. There are currently 60,000 members in Australia, both males and females.

The aim of Scouts Australia is to help children and young people achieve their full potential in life. This is done by individualized, fun, adventurous, challenging, leadership and team work-orientated programs.

"Be Prepared" is the well known slogan for Scouts, and sums up the essence of what Scouting aims to teach young people

This is a co-operative program requiring sensitive understanding of the traditional practises of the Yolngu People associated with the Donydji Homeland, always taking cognisance of the aspirations of the people whom we seek to assist. The banner for the program is "*MITTJIWU DJAKKA* – Caring for Our Community". The program is aimed at providing education and skills training for young persons and is likely to have an input value in excess of \$1 million by the time it is completed: it has many facets. The ultimate aim is to deliver a viable model for action that can be applied in other remote indigenous communities.

"Co-operation" is the byword of the program and this approach can be well exemplified by reference to one subsidiary project. There is no mains power supply within several hundred kilometres of the Donydji site: electricity is required for lighting and light industrial power uses. A decision was taken to trial the viability of photo voltaic (solar) and wind-powered generators to meet the need. The Melbourne Club and its sister club in Osaka, Japan, decided to seek a Matching Grant from The Rotary Foundation to support this project, and the Rotary Club of Nhulunbuy agreed to represent the local District in that Application. It is pleasing to be able to now advise that The Rotary Foundation has awarded a Matching Grant of US\$24,800 to the project. These funds will be of great assistance; furthermore, it is significant that this Grant will be expended on a project in Australia.

## Have A Heart - Give A Part


**Have A Heart - Give A Part** is Rotary Club of Williamstown's Australiawide project to combat the low rate of organ donation in Australia, established by Rotarian Doctor Ronnie Goldberg.

100 Australians die each year while awaiting organ transplants and at any time there are about 2000 people on Australian transplant waiting lists. So whilst Australia has one of the highest success rates in the world in transplant operation, it also has the lowest organ donation level in the developed world.

Have A Heart, Give A Part seeks to increase awareness of the need for healthy people to register as organ donors and:

- raise awareness of the current Australia shortage of organs
- increase the numbers on the organ donor registry
- fund research

Together with ARHRF, Rotary Club of Williamstown has provided over \$200,000 over the last 3 years to the Alfred Hospital's Heart and Lung Transplant team to investigate the reality of using organs from non-heart beating donors, i.e. a registered organ donor whose heart as well as brain has stopped functioning.

This work is yielding results and a recent update from Professor Greg Snell of the Alfred Hospital describes progress to date.





"Thanks to Rotary's kick start we are moving well on a number of fronts:

We have performed 8 human double lung transplants at The Alfred using the non-heart beating approach to organ donation. A paper has just been accepted for publication in the prestigious American Journal of Transplantation describing the detail and acknowledging the Rotary Club of Williamstown and the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund. The work is being featured at The Transplantation Society World Meeting in Sydney in August and the 4th Non Heart Beating Donation Meeting in London in May. The majority of these organ retrievals have included some other combination of other organ transplant as appropriate and technically possible (kidneys, liver, corneas, heart valves).

Networker

The organ perfusion rig that was developed to prove the feasibility for non-heart beating lung donation is now being applied to xenotransplant lungs, ie. lungs from genetically modified pigs that will one day be able to be transplanted into humans and not be rejected. We aim to perfuse these lungs with human blood and show they can survive for protracted periods."

## **April Is Rotary Magazine Month**

Around the Rotary world there are 31 Rotary regional magazines in 23 different languages allowing Rotarians to communicate with each other to spread good ideas and to recognize achievements.

In Australia and New Zealand, we are serviced by one of the top Rotary Magazines in the world - Rotary Down Under. It is, of course, abbreviated (how unusual for Rotary to 'abbreviate' anything) to the more commonly used description RDU.

This year, we are proud to acknowledge that the Chair of the Management Committee of RDU is our own Vance Hilton - PDG and Past President of the Rotary Club of Flemington.

#### A Brief History Of RDU

This April this year RDU will celebrates its 43<sup>rd</sup> Birthday.

Rotary Down Under commenced, and remained, as a complimentary publication to the official magazine of Rotary International – The Rotarian - until 1976. At that time it received approval from the RI Board of Directors to be, for an experimental period, an acceptable alternative to the official magazine.

In 1978, the experiment having been successful, Rotary Down Under became the world's first Rotary Regional Magazine to gain full recognition by the RI Board as an approved and prescribed regional magazine. In 1980 it was designated an "official" regional magazine of Rotary International- the first of many regional magazines to gain official status.

#### **Ownership**

Rotary Down Under is wholly owned by Rotarians who subscribe to it and serve in the clubs where it is the prescribed official publication.

#### The Name

The first name proposed for our regional magazine was: "The Rotary Family"- to emphasize the close affinity of Rotarians everywhere and to emphasize the involvement of wives and children of Rotarians in Rotary activities. This name was submitted to the RI General Secretary George Means. However, General Secretary Means thought the name was unsuitable as he considered the name of the magazine should reflect its position as a Rotary publication.

The name Rotary Down Under was adopted by the Governors of the time after consideration of several other proposed titles.

In fact the name was 'thrown in' as a facetious suggestion to the Editor after the after a protracted multiple rejection process - 'fine, upstanding' candidates such as "Australian Rotary", "Rotary Australasia", "Rotary in the South Pacific", "Rotary in Australia and New Zealand", "Rotary Under The Southern Cross", "Rotary in the Antipodes", "Rotary ANZ", "Rotary Anzang" (Australia, N.Z and New Guinea). Perhaps, after reviewing these names, the Governors chose wisely in finally opting for Rotary Down Under.

Rotary Down Under is constantly seeking contributions promoting unique projects, programs and achievements of Rotary clubs and individuals. However, please remember many everyday Rotary club events do not really achieve unique status and are therefore better suited to local newspapers and the Networker.

## **Boy Eyes New Life**

Bradley Bola is looking forward to returning to his Papua New Guinea home with a new outlook on life, thanks to the Rotary Club of Brighton North.

The club raised \$21,000 to help pay for the 11-year-old to have a life-changing cranial operation at the Royal Children's Hospital.

The young cricket and rugby fan recently had a metal frame, which was pinned to his skull, removed and now awaits a clean bill of health so he can return home.

Bradley has encephalocele – a condition where the brain pressures on the eye sockets and can cause the eyes to pop out. Without treatment, his condition would have deteriorated and dramatically affected his appearance and quality of life.

The club became aware of Bradley's plight through Rotary Overseas Medical Aid for Children and raised money through a dinner dance and auction towards the cost of a cranial operation.

Brighton North president Richard Potter said the club chose Bradley from a Rotary aid list of eligible overseas children.

Bradley and his mother Nellie Bola arrived in Australia in September and have lived with a local Rotary host family.

The four-hour operation was performed by Royal Children's plastic surgeon Andrew Heggie and his team shortly after the Bolas' arrival.

Ms Bola said the operation, which addressed both Bradley's short upper jaw and shallow eye sockets, was a "life changing operation" that gave him a new look and confidence.

"We've had so many of those episodes of (his) eyes popping out....and so that's all behind us now," she said.

Bradley had to wear a frame on his head for three months immediately after the operation, and could only drink through a straw. The frame was removed just before his 11<sup>th</sup> birthday on 17 December.

## MUNA 2008

In November 2007 and March 2008 all relevant information regarding M.U.N.A. was despatched to all clubs by email and letter with a request to respond to the host club, Altona City, to confirm whether they proposed to take part or not. ## **Volunteering In the Solomon Islands**

The Rotary Club of North Balwyn is seeking a volunteer to oversee its international service program in the Central Province of the Solomon Islands.

The club is seeking expressions of interest from a young Rotarian, or person associated with Rotary programs, to spend up to two months on the island of Tulagi, which is located an hour and half by small boat from Honiara, the capital of the Solomons.

The Rotary club's "Adopt the Community of Tulagi" program is entering its fifth a year, and has already seen extensive improvements to the McMahon High School at Tulagi, including installation of water tanks, new ceiling fans and lighting and a septic system for the 500 students.

But there is more to be done and one significant current project is a proposal to provide micro credit loans to develop small businesses, such as a bakery and a sewing centre, in Tulagi and the club is looking for a volunteer to manage the early stages of the program. Much of the preliminary work has already been completed.

Another current major project is improvement to the infrastructure at the Tulagi Medical Centre, including installation of six water tanks, a security fence around the site and a standby generator; all of which has been made possible with funding through a Matching Grant from the Rotary Foundation.







A contractor will install the water tanks and a Rotary volunteer team will visit Tulagi to build the fence.

The Rotary Club of North Balwyn also intends building a trades training block at the local McMahon High School and a second Rotary volunteer team will visit Tulagi to undertake construction.

The volunteer we are seeking to spend time at Tulagi will assist with liaison on all these projects and other associated activities, including contact with the local community.

Tulagi is typical of the developing world. It doesn't offer five star accommodation. But the "Adopt the Community of Tulagi" project is making a difference in the development and progress of the local people.

Those associated with the project have found it very satisfying and the Rotary Club of North Balwyn would be keen to hear from prospective volunteers who may wish to spend time as part of this development program with the community at Tulagi. We see this as a great opportunity in line with Rotary's commitment to "Service Above Self".

This is a volunteering role, but there will be support for travel and accommodation.

## **Rotary Camp Getaway**

The Rotary Club of Brighton Beach recently contributed another successful working bee to assist with general maintenance at Rotary Camp Getaway. About 12 members from the club had a wonderful time of fellowship whilst getting many maintenance jobs achieved.

The Rotary Youth Camp at Axedale was established by the Rotary Club of Bendigo in the late 1940s, immediately after the Second World War. The ethos behind the project was to provide camping and recreational activities for children whose family had been affected by the ravages of the WW2. The tradition of the camp continued for the next 50 years with a huge number of children and young people experiencing the wonderful facilities and riverside activities afforded by the camp when groups were accommodated from schools, youth groups, Cubs and Scouts, Church organisations, sporting and recreation clubs, special interest groups, etc.

Like many great projects in Rotary, the idea for the current redevelopment of Rotary Camp Getaway at Axedale sprang from one person, Ken Maxfield, of the Rotary Club of North Balwyn. Ken's dream of a camp for children with special needs has now become a reality, thanks to serendipity and the power of Rotary and its hundreds of dedicated

volunteers. This vision has now progressed to achieve a camp for people of all abilities, with those with special needs having priority for bookings.

The community currently benefits from the recreation options that Rotary has created on the site at Axedale with disability groups such as Interchange and Young Stroke Survivors Group; general community and welfare groups such as the Salvation Army Younger Mums group; music camps, Scouts and Cub groups, Rotary Youth programs; young people's sporting teams, school groups, etc, having recently utilised the camp facilities.

Thousands of voluntary hours have already gone into redeveloping the site from the former basis of army type huts, to the self contained units with full disabled facilities, modern dormitory and the many improvements now available to people of all abilities.
