Rotary Showcase – Federation Square



A Hope for Peace

Being lost in the middle of the bustling, hazy, city of Bangkok, Thailand, is not ideal for a 17-year-old Australian girl. But, it was a moment that changed my life.

I was on Rotary Youth Exchange and despite excellent instructions from my caring host-family; I had no idea how the intricate bus system worked, and hadn't mastered the language yet to ask. After boarding the wrong bus for the third time, a young student calmly stood up, took me by the arm and walked me miles down the road to the right stop. She spoke little English, but waited patiently until my bus arrived and told the driver my destination. It must have added a full hour to her day, and she wanted nothing in return – just to help a stranger.

I was shocked. I had never encountered such kindness. That was one of many moments I was humbled by the generosity of the Thai people during my exchange year, and something that I hold up as proof of genuine compassion in the world.

Today, I am the founding editor of *Peace News* – a new media platform that provides alternative news stories from conflict zones. While mainstream war reporting focuses on violence, explosions, and hatred, we focus on telling stories of peace-builders. Wars need to be covered, but we aim to provide balance to the reporting – in every conflict zone there are people taking risks for peace, and we want to show that side as well.

In my line of work I see, and hear about, horrific violence, and it's often difficult to keep faith in humanity. I believe it's a growing fear for many people today, and sensationalist media representations of how 'bad the world is becoming' don't help. We often need reminding that there are still great people out there, that there are inspiring examples of tolerance and empathy still going on.

My year as an exchange student showed me that there is good reason to have hope, and provided me with a platform to direct my career. Through the endless examples of kindness from a host country, and also exposure to many cultures through other exchange students, I saw enormous capacity for a global community. Rotary taught me to appreciate and respect diversity — a hot topic today with global immigration debates.

I have no idea who that student was who stopped to direct a confused foreigner all those years ago, but her act reminds me daily of what one moment of empathy can do. She taught me to have a little trust in the world we are so often trying furiously to change – and to always travel with a bus map.

Rotary Backs Trachoma Drive

Rotary's 2017-18 International President, Australia's Ian Riseley, wants a trachoma-free Australia by 2021, Rotary's 100th year in Australia.

Trachoma is an infectious eye disease that can be prevented with good hygiene practices. It is still present in remote Aboriginal communities and can lead to permanent blindness. Australia is the world's only developed country with trachoma. The World Health Organisation has a global goal to eliminate trachoma by 2020.



With surgery and antibiotics, trachoma rates in affected communities have been reduced substantially. The original 200 'hot-spots' have dwindled to around 50, mainly in central Australia. More work is still required to ensure that hygiene practices and the community environments are improved to completely eliminate the disease. Prevention is now the focus.

Melbourne RC's Rob McGuirk and Albert Park's Kerry Kornhauser have together established a not-for-profit company to run the project. It can accept tax-deductible donations. Funds have been raised to enable the engagement of a project manager, Rotary Foundation Scholar and qualified public health worker, Lien Trinh, over the next three years.

PDG Dr Murray Verso has also joined the team, adding his medical experience and understanding.

RI Zone 8 Director Noel Trevaskis is asking all Districts to support the project which will cut the spread of trachoma. This spread occurs by hands, clothing, shared towels, bedding, and from flies which have contacted runny eyes or noses.

Some of the projects clubs can support include:

- funding a communal washing machines or facilities
- subsidising hygiene kits of towels, soaps, and toothbrushes
- sponsoring the operations of remote community swimming pools to help keep kids clean and active

Rob, Kerry and the team are working with other NGO's and corporates to create the projects and to enable the delivery of products and services to affected communities.

We will focus on Polio Eradication, medical reconstructive surgery, the Sumba Eye programme and Days for Girls, plus much more.

Community Health programs on display include our Rotary Cancer Research, Australian Rotary Health,

blood pressure testing and how defibrillators save lives. Showcasing other community programs including BusyFeet, Violence Free Families, and Camp Getaway, we introduce the new Project Embrace. Women in Rotary will promote the diversity of Rotary.

Any Showcase of Rotary could not be complete without promoting our outstanding Youth Development programs, from EarlyAct to the Model United National Assembly, or from Youth Exchange to the National Youth Science Forum. We plan to have alumni from all these great initiatives to explain how they make a difference to young lives.

Peace Fellow Update

A short update from a very thankful Peace Fellow:

Rotary Peace Fellows - Applied Field Experience...

The Peace Fellowship requires an Applied Field Experience during the European Summer (June-July 2016 for me). For my Field Experience, I worked with Caritas Switzerland in Jordan. My role was in supporting the evaluation and improvement of the Counselling, Health, Humanitarian Assistance, Education and Livelihoods programmes run by partner organisation Caritas Jordan. These important programmes are provided to vulnerable Jordanians and Syrian refugees that have fled the ongoing civil war.

During this time, I worked specifically on improving the assessment of beneficiaries based on Vulnerability Assessment Framework provided by the United Nations High Commission for Refugees. I also managed a project aimed at providing livelihoods opportunities for Syrians and Jordanians in the North and South of the Jordan.



Uppsala University is a research university in Uppsala, Sweden, and is the oldest university in Sweden and all of the Nordic countries, founded in 1477. It ranks among the best universities in Northern Europe in international rankings.

Internship in Jordan...

Instead of returning to complete more subjects for the Fall Semester (August 2016-January 2017) I stayed on in Amman, Jordan to work with the Norwegian Refugee Council. Specifically, I worked with their Syria Response Office, providing humanitarian support to Syrian's inside Syria.

My specific role was in supporting the Programmes Unit, which provides Information, Counselling and Legal Assistance, Education, Shelter, Wash and Food Security support to Syrians in need. As a highly respected and capable International Non-Government Organisation, the opportunity to contribute to the work of the Norwegian Refugee Council was an incredible opportunity, particularly given the protracted nature of the Syrian conflict, now in its sixth year.

Back to Sweden, Masters Thesis and last 5 months of the Peace Fellowship...

In recent weeks, I have returned to Sweden to complete my last 6 months of the Fellowship and my Masters Thesis. The entire Semester will be spent developing a strong social science research paper fit for Uppsala's Department of Peace and Conflict Research's famously high standards of academic research.

International Women's Day Breakfasts

Inspiring speakers, vigorous debate and great food make up the packages as Rotary clubs across Australasia plan for International Women's Day Breakfasts in 2017.

Since 2012, District 9800 – through *Women in Rotary* – has held six of these breakfasts, drawing an average audience of over 1200 (of which 80 per cent are non-Rotarians!) and reaching more than 5000 people.

This year's keynote Melbourne Breakfast, organized by Albert Park RC and helped by half a dozen clubs, will be at the Palladium Crown on Wednesday 8 March 201

At these events, Women in Rotary showcases Rotary, spreads the word that Rotary welcomes women, and invites attendees to visit a Rotary meeting with the "Rotary is not just for blokes" invitation.

In the weeks before and after International Women's Day, the media is full of gender and diversity coverage. Rotary's Southbank breakfast, run by Albert Park RC, helps us be seen as a progressive body that encourages diversity.

International Women's Day is also an opportunity for us to reflect on how diversity can increase our membership. At the moment, only 24.9 per cent of our members are women, Australia wide.



The D9800 breakfast last year raised over \$50,000 for charities including Violence Free Families, Interplast, The Butterfly Foundation and Early Learning Autism. Charities this year are Violence Free Families, Interplast, ROMAC, Early Learning Autism.

Women in Rotary's 2017 goals are 30% female membership in Australasia (current Australia ratio, about 24%; District 9800 is on 25.3%); gender balance in 20% of clubs; and 40% of District Board positions to be held by women.

Responsible Business Award

A huge Congratulations to Stephanie Woollard, founder of Seven Women, who has won a global award from Rotary International for "Responsible Business," honoured at the UN Headquarters in November last year.

The Responsible Business Award recognises extraordinary people and business partners who have improved communities by providing employment opportunities, job training, mentoring, and innovation.

Stephanie said it was such an honour to have her work with Seven Women recognised on a global scale.

"My approach has always been to give a hand up, not a hand out," said Stephanie.

"It's not simple welfare but empowerment. The lessons we teach will have impact for decades, or even longer, as the knowledge is passed to the next generation. Sustainability is always a key in anything Seven Women does, and it's wonderful that Rotary recognises the various projects



worldwide that are making a difference in the world we live in."

In 2006, Stephanie Woollard was just 22 years old when she started the Seven Women Project in Nepal to help seven disabled women who were making soaps and candles to sell in local markets. Ten years on, Woollard's business is now helping over five thousand Nepali women.



What does it feel like to be in an iron lung?

Rotarian Roger Frank built his own iron lung replica to teach a new generation about polio.



Dispatched to Ghana with a fellow British Rotarian to scout club service opportunities, Roger Frank hadn't planned their visit to coincide with National Immunization Days, but the pair – Frank and Dr. Carl Hallam – jumped, unhesitating, into the thick of inoculations. During a four-day stretch in October 2015, nearly 2,000 children in the area were protected from poliomyelitis. The effort galvanized Frank, who brainstormed for a way to do even more at home: How could he promote polio eradication when few of his countrymen gave much thought to the scourge?

Recalling the fear that gripped the UK, the U.S., and elsewhere during the height of the polio epidemic in the early 1950s, Frank, a past president of the Rotary Club of Upper Eden, thought of the iron lung, a device largely relegated to museums and history books. The lifesaving mechanical respirator was a potent, if depressing, symbol of the debilitating disease. An iron lung, Frank reasoned, would educate younger generations who grew up free of the fear created by polio, a virus that is spread easily, during the 20th century.

He hoped to borrow a model to put on tour to serve as a reminder that the polio fight remains unfinished. "I spent the last three months of 2015 looking for an iron lung in

hospitals, etc.," says Frank, 65. "I had hoped to source an original unit, but they have all been scrapped and those that remain are in museums, and they would not part with them. Being fully committed to the project, I had no other option than to build an iron lung myself.

"This proved quite a challenge," even for a retired mechanical engineer and self-described "nut and bolt man," particularly after he resolved that only a fully functioning machine would do. "I learned many years ago that the dafter the project, the easier it is to get good publicity for the cause," he quips.

ALTERNATIVE MEMBERSHIP

During its last visioning exercise, some two years ago, in the report to the board, Yarra Bend Rotary recognised the need to review the range of membership categories it offered, to assist in the effort to increase membership.

Three additional categories were considered, Corporate, Business and Associate membership. One of our members developed criteria for each of these categories. When reviewed by the board, it was considered the most useful category to which efforts should be directed, was Associate.

Simultaneously with these deliberations, contact had been maintained with a younger lady who had expressed a desire to become more involved in Rotary, however, was not in a position to consider full membership.

When Associate membership was suggested, Liz Rodriguez agreed it was attractive. Early in 2016 Liz was inducted as an Associate member, agreeing to abide by the criteria developed by the club.

During this process, the club consulted the Rotary constitution and there seemed to be no barrier, based on the criteria developed. Ironically, the RI Council of Legislation, which met in early 2016, ratified the category of Associate membership.

On this basis, we believe Yarra Bend may be the first club in District 9800 to have inducted an Associate member.

Towards a Polio-free World

EVANSTON, III. (17 January 2017) — Rotary today announced \$35 million in grants to support the global effort to end polio, bringing the humanitarian service organization's contribution to \$140 million since January 2016.

Nearly half of the funds Rotary announced today (\$16.15 million) will support the emergency response campaigns in Nigeria and the Lake Chad Basin (Chad, northern Cameroon, southern Niger and Central African Republic). Four cases of polio were detected in Nigeria in 2016, which had previously not seen a case since July 2014.

With these cases, funding is needed to support rapid response plans in Nigeria and surrounding countries to stop the outbreak.



While significant strides have been made against the paralyzing disease, with just 35 cases reported in 2016, polio remains a threat in hard-to-reach and underserved areas, and conflict zones. To sustain this progress, and protect all children from polio, experts say \$1.5 billion is needed.

Rotary has contributed more than \$1.6 billion, including matching funds from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, and countless volunteer hours since launching its polio immunization program, PolioPlus, in 1985.

In 1988, Rotary became a spearheading partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative with the World Health Organization (WHO), UNICEF, U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and was later joined by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Since the initiative launched, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99.9 percent, from about 350,000 cases a year to 35 confirmed in 2016, and no cases in 2017.

A Reflection on "World of Difference"

There is so much to share in a personal reflection of my "passion project". Since just stumbling into someone else's idea...and here I acknowledge and congratulate wholeheartedly former Rotary Melbourne South member, Lena Condos, who introduced humanitarian travel to developing countries to Rotary, and the sustainable assistance that can be achieved. She inspired me.

There have been hundreds of friends met along the way, both Cambodian and Aussie. Some were school students from Australia, who left tourists and came back as humanitarians. It has been an utter privilege to be part of that exploration. Often these students have known nothing of the world outside Australia. Gently being shown, with humour and support, rural communities without running water or electricity, starving people surviving by subsistence farming and all the challenges that entails provides the students food for thought. Seeing how supporting the local communities with donations of just 2 pigs, a bore water pump and biosand water filters was a profound education. Getting involved in helping the local people build the filters

and pumps forges friendships. Then seeing outcomes of where 2 pigs were donated several years ago to a family is joyous. The family has bred their 2 pigs and sold them for an income stream. The difference that has made to their daily life is irrigation for their crops, a motor cycle, 2 rooms in their little home, wooden walls to replace the thatch, a water bore and water filter, a small generator, a fan and a TV. Affluence! Those two pigs were donated by my son Will on his lifechanging first trip to Cambodia in 2012. Since then he has taught in a remote village school for 3 months, and led 2 student group tours.



From Sara...Upper Yarra Secondary College Tour:

"Cambodia you've been the most incredible host - Meeting all your people, the ones who needed our help, and the ones who have received it.

"Your culture is honest and beautiful and I cant believe we have to leave it already.

"Waterfalls in the rainforest, water drilling in Chress village, teaching in schools, donating at FLO, visiting the zoo and changing the lives of an entire community in the remote village.

"This has been an incredibly real and beautiful experience, thank you."

Partnerships between Rotary Clubs has enabled such powerful outcomes in terms of large scale projects and sustainability outcomes. Lifelong Rotary friendships have been forged through sharing deep and humbling experiences together where we have laughed and cried at situations too impossible perhaps in Australia to even imagine. I have memories of desperately ill people unable to afford medicines and just sitting quietly waiting to die. Being there at the right time place, with just the simplest most basic antibiotics have allowed lives to be saved.. Unimaginable and unthinkable in Australia.

Hurtling down dust tracks in tuk tuks without the thought for a seat belt, sharing the seat with 3 treadle sewing machines and legs over the top of one of them. Sharing a beer in the pool discussing different options for plans. Kat John (RC Melbourne Park) had an email footer "Say yes and then figure out the how". You may agree that I can identify with that statement. Thankfully while having these lurches from one world and into another – horror at times in desperate Cambodia and then back into safe leafy Brighton Mark remains, always secure and grounded, ready to counsel. He writes up Foundation grant applications on behalf of clubs, works so closely on the Foundation committee with logistics and financial trails to ensure correct process is followed.

So many clubs involved, so many Rotarians and friends willing to action and champion change for better when they understand that World of Difference continually monitors the progress year after year.

I believe that it is imperative that in developing countries that we don't go in with any sense of superiority or wanting to do work for the local people. I personally don't subscribe to projects that go to build homes or schools for locals. I haven't met a person that cant hammer a nail into a bit of wood – even I can (but please don't tell Mark that!) Rithy taught me the lesson of a hand up not a hand out over the past 7 years. He knocked it into me and repeated it over and over. It was very difficult to break a cycle of dependence in a community where we started giving donations. Enabling and

working with the people is what Rithy does so well. In his wise words, "he stands beside them".

Rithy is the "World of Difference" project manager in Cambodia. He tirelessly goes about living this reality every day on our behalf. So I should conclude my reflection on acknowledging Rithy. A Rotarian, a humanitarian who knows the needs of his country so intimately, and someone I am privileged to now call my friend.


